



A terrible calamity happened on the

11th inst., in the coal mine of the Ebbw Vale Steel, Iron and Coal Company, one of the largest iron and coal proprietors in South Wales. It is situated a few hundred yards from the Abercarne Railway station, in the Western Valley section of full of weddings, and the mistakes of 1878 Monmouthshire Railway. The valley is | will after that be irretrievable. one of the most charming in the district and lies within sight of the Crumlin Viaduct, so well known to travelers. The pit, which is 330 yards deep and one of the largest and best worked in the district, was vielding 1,000 tons of steam coal daily. At ten minutes past twelve, Wednesday afternoon, a loud rumbling noise was heard, quickly follow ed by a flash of flame from the pit's mouth and a column of smoke, dust and debris ascending high in the air. Three denotations were successively heard on the service. The framework and castings of the pit were thrown to a height of 300 ft above the mouth of the shaft. The explosion damaged the winding gear, thus destroying the only means of communication with the men in the pit. As soon as the gear could be repaired working parties went down the shaft, and eighty-two men and boys, working within a few hundred vards of the shaft were rescued. But it became evident, as attempts were made to advance into the workings, that little hope could be entertained of any men surviving. About four hundred yards from the bottom of the shaft are the stables, and here, fourteen horses were found all dead. Beyond this point the explorers could not go, on account of the impurity of the air and the prevalence of choke-damp. Volunteer explorers succeeded in bringing out twelve men, very much burned, and also seven dead bodies. Thirteen additional bodies were recovered at about two o'clock Thursday morning, and four of the last twelve men brought out alive died from their burns

during the night. It had been evident throughout the afternoon that the fire in the mine was gaining headway, and a careful inspection made by the volunteer party that brought the last dead men to the surface, revealed the fact that the fire had reached a point within a few feet of the trized. bottom of the main shaft, and all hopes of further rescues had to be abandoned.
