these facts were apparent. That the aggregate cost of collecting the entire revenue, under the old Administration, showed an increase of 153 per cent. in seven years, or an average of 22 per cent. per annum ; while the entire cost under the present Administration increased nine per cent. in three years, or an average of three per cent. per annum. If they deducted extraordinary expenditure, such as the Weights and Measures Act, the Adulteration of Food Act, the increase of Postoffices, for which latter item hon. gentlemen opposite did not appear to blame the Government, the increased expenditure under the old Administration, as compared with the present, stood as follows : under the old Administration, 22 per cent.; under the present Administration, 1 per cent. per annum.
