About the time when the Salmon fisher men of the Islands at the entrance of the Miramichi were to commence their season's work last spring, the local Overseers received, from the Inspector at St. John, instructions under which no nets were to be licensed to extend more than 150 fathoms from the shore. ### New Fish-Preserving Process.

Mr. Johannes Eckart, of Munich, claims have discovered a method of keeping fish perfectly fresh for many days after capture, his plan of procedure consisting impregnating them by means of hydraulic pressure with a weak solution of salicylic acid, packing them in casks or cases, and pouring gelatine over them. The latter serves to prevent their becoming stiff or dry. Prepared and packed in the above manner, they may, it is said, remain ten or fifteen days, and even longer, en route, without detriment to their flavour or appearance; and Mr. Roosen, of Hamburg, who is turning this new system of preservation to practical account, has received the most satisfactory reports respecting his consignments of fresh and salt water fish to distant countries. Trout caught near Munich, and treated according to Mr. Eckart's plan. arrived, it appears at Bergen, in Norway, and in New York in a perfectly fresh state; and sea fish despatched from Rinkjobing, in Denmark, to Dresden, Leipsic and other island German towns, have dealers to give orders for weekly deliverto arrange for regularly supplying the impregnating machines, large enough to hold 400 lbs. of fish, will prepare some 8,000 lbs. per diem, a considerable amount of piscine produce can thus be quickly preserved for despatch to any destination; and since ice is altogether dispensed with, and no necessity exists for sending the fish by fast trains, the cost of transport is of course greatly reduced. 
