"Whereas, It has come to the knowledge of the Grand Lodge that the Grand Orient of France has caused to be stricken from their constitution that part of the "Ancient Landmarks" requiring a belief in the existence of a Supreme Being, which action we believe to be contrary to the spirit and teaching of ancient Freemasonry, d destroying one of its most vital priniples: therefore.

Resolved, That we refuse to recognize as a Free Mason any person initiated, passed, or raised in a body where the existance of a Supreme Being is denied or ignored." The order looks to the "Great Architect of the Universe" as the source and fountain of all wisdom, holiness and virtue. To deny His existence is to strike at the very foundation of Freemasonary. One of the questions propounded to every candidate for admission is, substantially: "To whom do you look in time of distress, perplexity, danger, etc.?" and the answer 'To God." The existence of a Supreme Being and the immortality of the soul are cardinal doctrines of the order. It is hardly possible to conceive of a free Mason who openly avows his acceptance of the pantheistical notions so long prevalent in France and Germany, and now asserting themselves in England and this country. -New York Star.
