The Senate of Canada is bidding fair to render its reorganization on a new basis necessary. A large majority of its members were appointed by Sir John Macdonald and, as is well known, many of them are too much inclined to trouble themselves with little else besides voting and talking as that gentleman desires. They took it upon themselves to defeat the proposed lease of the Pembina of River du Cache to McKnight's office Branch Railway near the close as the petition got up points out, is comin moving the adjournment of the len's Restorer, Rondeletia, Mona Bouquet, Florida House commented strongly upon their action. He characterized it as untenable and unconstitutional, and remarked that, although he was one of those who helped to give the Upper Chamber its present constitution, he had had occasion during his experience of the last ten years to revise his opinion. He had some hope, notwithstanding this usurpation of their rights by the Senate, to be able to give the people of Manitoba the railway com-

munication they so much required,

though perhaps in a modified form. Dr. Tupper defended the conduct of the Senate, contending that the reasons assigned by the Government for their policy in regard to this matter had been overturned in the Upper House. After some remarks by Sir John Macdonald in the same sense, the Premier pointed out that both gentlemen had misstated parliamentary law. "They had deliberately set themselves to work to injure, at any cost the Government, and deprive the Province of Railway communication. The Senate had entered upon a course which was most dangerous to the constitution of the country It had entered upon a course which every member of the House was bound, from considerations of national safety. in a parliamentary sense, to resent and resist; and it had entered upon a course which would be dangerous to the constitution of that Chamber as it exists, by initiating agitation in the country which could only result in disagreement between the great authorities of the State; and there would be a necessity for changes which every one of them could have wished would not have been

of its proper and legal sphere for the purpose of doing the work which Sir John and Dr. Tupper cannot do in the Commens, to so change its constitution as to either render it elective or provide for sufficient additional members to out vote the coterie known as "Sir John's automatons" and thus secure the proper discharge by both branches of Parliament of their functions in accord with the principles of responsible Government. A cable special to the Telegram says that the British Admiralty are making extensive arrangements for the purpose of opposing Russia's scheme of establishing a fleet of cruisers to prey upon British commerce. Naval centres are to be establish. ed in the Bahamas and at Newfoundland, in the Atlantic and at Victoria and Fiji in

> At each of these stations the fleet will consist of three turret-ships and three gunboats of the heaviest armament, two of the latter unarmored. Cruisers have been put in commission for special service. The Boadicea, an unarmed corvette, with a capacity of steaming 14 knots an hour, just commissioned, will probably proceed to the Bahamas. The Admiralty have also under consideration the adoption of a patent propeller, of which marvels are related. It is claimed that this invention can, in a few hours, be applied to any steamer, and by it the swiftness of vessels

will be increased one sixth. COAL MINE DISASTER. -On the 21st inst. an explosion occurred in the new winning of the old Sydney mines which caused the death of six men. At the time of the explosion, there were between thirty and forty men in the pits, a number of whom escaped, but ten or twelve were taken out unconscious. The first to enter the mine after the explosion were three brothers Sullivan, who succeeded in rescuing thirteen of the cutters, who had been overcome by the gas after the explosion, which took place in the north side of the mine, where sixteen pairs of cutters were at work. There was a large number of men at work in the south side of the mine, but all escaped uninjured. One of the Sullivans was prostrated while searching for the dead,
