My husband's farm is situated on the Scadouc river about three-fourths of a mile from the bridge at Hanington's mill. I remember Friday, the 12th Oct. last; it was a very well as usual that day and in my own house. It was after midnight when I went to bed because I had been waiting for our men, who had been winnowing grain and didn't get to bed until after ting in the kitchen after midnight with my grand-daughter and I heard a wagon son, who had been in Buctouche, coming home. I told my grand-daughter to take the candle and go to the door and give him light to get out of the carriage. She had two doors to open and when she opened the outer door she said : "Grand-mother, there's no one here." When she said this I said, "Hold on, we'll listen; perhaps it's some one came up in the yard and turned back again," but could hear or see nothing more of it. Could not hear the noise after the door was opened. I heard the wagon very plainly; it came up very fast. From the main road to our house is a distance of 45 rods. A carriage could come up the lane, pass through the gate at the 'upper end and go right on to the river. Could not hear a carriage as plainly as I heard this if it were on the main road. If the wagon took this course it would pass within about 80 feet of the kitchen. I went to bed in a very short time after this. Did not hear the wagon return.
