

Municipal Council. The following is our Report of the proceedings of the Municipal Council, continued from where we broke off last week: WEDNESDAY -- AFTERNOON SESSION. In consequence of the number of Liquor

Licenses to be paid for, and which must engage the Secretary Treasurer, the Council adjourned one hour. On reassembling-Coun. Betts reported that in regard to the petition of the Ratepayers of Derby

praying that liquor Licenses be granted, the Committee appointed in the matter could only report progress. Coun. Bourne, presented a Petition from William Duncan Shaw a Ratepayer of the Parish of Derby, praying to be ap-

pointed a Surveyor of Lumber. After some discussion Coun. Fotheringham moved that the prayer of the Petition be granted. The Chairman suggested that the Peti-

tion be received and discussed at the pro-

per time.

Coun. Bourne said that Mr. Shaw was a resident and Ratepayer who was assessed for \$800 in the Parish. Coun. Betts said the names appended to

the petition were for the year 1877, and that two of them were those of Surveyors in Derby, and should not be used in con nection with this year's appointment. Coun. Park said the reason given against Mr. Shaw being appointed was

recorded which was done accordingly. Coun. Crocker presented a petition of Andrew Morrison of Derby, who had lived four years in that locality, to be appointed a surveyor. The applicant was
