RAILWAY MORTALITY IN THE U. S .-During the past year the mortality among railway companies in the United States has been immense. The number of companies involved, the mileage of road put inder foreclosure and the amount of money lost were larger than they have been in any former year. Fifty-four roads, having 3,-875 miles of way, and capital stock or bonded indebtedness amounting to \$199,-000,000, were sold under judical order. Sixteen other roads, having 2,388 miles, and \$256,000,000 of debts, have been ordered by the Courts to be sold, but have not yet been put at auction. In addition to these there are forty-four roads against which foreclosure proceedings are pending. These last roads have a length of 5,409 miles, and are indebted to the extent of \$320,000,000. There are thus 114 railroad companies with 11,672 miles of road, and stock and debts to the enormous extent of \$775,421,630, either dead or in process of dying, and the greater part of the money invested in these undertakings has vanish ed. The losses in 1877 on account of the shrinkage of railroad securities amount to not less than one-sixth of the national debt of the United States, and involve about a sixth of the entire railroad investment of the country.
