





There Justice Smith charged Judge Ferris with having knocked the cabman down, and Alderman Morris was a witness to it. Justice Kilbreth thereupon detained Judge Ferris, who seemed to be mystified by the proceedings, for examination, and gave him a seat behind the bar. During his detention he had quite a number of calters, and was several times kindly allowed to go out on his own parole, in the custody of his friends, to visit interesting places in the neighborhood. During this time the telegrams were sent to Chatham. It, however, appears that Shippegan has been completely ignored for the last three or four years, notwithstanding the large amount of business doing and the corresponding travelling over the road; therefore the whole amount is expended between Tracadie and Caraquet. How is it that Shippegan is thrown out in the cold? Does it not represent a fair proportion of the population and votes of the County? Or, is it that the people of this Parish are too insignificant to be noticed? Or, again, is it that they do not pay in their just tribute to the revenue of the province? No, the reason is that the people of Shippegan have been independent, and have refused on all and every occasion to bow the knee to the political principles of the President of the Council; and the Supervisor of Great Roads refuses what is fairly and honestly due to the people of this parish. Unless the people meet the views of this interest both here and elsewhere in the County they need not apply for a dollar's worth of work. Now, Mr. Editor, this is a sad state of things. This is a free country, and undoubtedly the people have a right to form and exercise a judgement of their own. Is it right, that because a certain party holds the reins of power, they should trample on the rights and privileges of our three hundred electors and keep

from them their just dues.
