### The Stumpage Grievance.

We begin our remarks on this subject by quoting the following from the Montreal Witness, when commenting on the late elections

> scarce. Lumber near the streams is nearly all cut away, and hauls are from long distances, making the cost of procuring logs much dearer than before. To show that the Government expected resistence in some shape to this unjust tax we might say that previous to its imposition, they sent agents to explore and report on the best localities and lumber districts in the County. These were noted, and carefully marked off. An arrangement was then made with some strong monied parties outside in the interests of the Government, giving them the commissioned privilege of buying those lands in their own apparent right, so that should applicants from this side of the Province refuse to buy in the lands under the stumpage arrangement, these outside par-

ties would buy them in, and thus compel our merchants to lease them from them at at increased or larger stumpage than the Government asked. Our merchants on arriving at Fredericton were not long in finding out the situation, as some of those interested parties appeared on the scene on the day of the sale, ready to buy in all the lands that our merchants required and they appeared quite capable of doing so. as they made a great dlsplay of their money, having large bundles of notes protruding from every pocket in their garments. When our merchants found that

the imposition of the tax was determined on, they had to submit, if they wished to secure the lands they needed, and agree to pay the Government tax, in preference to the tax (imaginary or otherwise) that might be imposed by the combination referred to. Now, let us look at the amount realized by the Government from this stumpage tax. We find from a reliable and detail-

ed statement kindly furnished us, that for the three years it has been in operation 1875-6-7, the sum of \$92,000 has been raised in this County alone, the stumpage tax being then 60 cts per 1000 sup. feet on logs. This amount does not take in the further sum of \$2,900 which was also realized on bark, birch and pine timber and other lumber, which makes a total of \$94,900 for those years. We subjoin a statement showing particulars of this tax for the year 1877, ending 31st of October, for


