



Free and open Churches.

The movement in England in favor of free and open churches-that is, in opposition to pew rents and churches closed nearly all the week, is making considerable progress both in England and Scotland. At an Annual Commemoration in connection with the Scottish Church held in Dundee, in the present year, Lord Forbes (in the chair) read a communication from Lord Kinnaird expressing his sympathy with the movement. His Lordship particularly expressed a hope that something would be done to ensure the new cathedral at Edinburgh being both free and open. The Bishop of Brechin advocated the same principle. He maintained not only that the practice of seat letting for before placing their orders elsewhere, as we sell money, but even the appropriating of particular seats for particular persons, was unscriptural. It puts giving in the light of a mere duty, and that of a fixed character irrespective of a man's income; and it consequently deprives it of the power to be a spiritual blessing to the giver, which charac-
