DERELICT VESSEL.—The master of the *burgue Herick Dirks* reported to Pilot M. Martin a few days ago that he passed in the Gulf a vessel bottom up, coppered, but he could not tell whether she was a barque or a ship.

MAIL SERVICE.—Two mails a week, instead of one, as heretofore, are now to go to Littleton and all intermediate offices on the Northwest. The extra service has been secured through the efforts of James Somers, Esq., Councillor.

SAILOR DROWNED.—Yesterday morning, early, as the barque *Mina*, from Liverpool was being towed up the River by the *Sulton*, when above Black Brook, a crew of 16, named Carl Olsen, one of the crew, fell from the royal yard arm into the River. The vessel was immediately cast off by the *Sulton* and a boat was launched, but before it could reach the spot the unfortunate had had sunk for the last time in life.

SHIPWRECK.—The Norwegian bark *Nord* arrived at Newcastle on Monday last, bringing the crew of the brig *Barbara* from Limerick for Miramichi, which was wrecked on St. Paul's Island the 5th inst., during a dense fog. On the 6th the vessel went to pieces. The crew remained on the rocks six days, and were cared for by Mr. Campbell, Superintendent of the Island. They were taken off on the 14th.

SHOCKING DEATH.—A man was found dead in a bear trap on the Pathurst Road last week. Correspondence which has passed between Chief of Police Stapledon and Coroner McLoughlin of Bathurst, indicates that the man of the deceased was Hans Jorgen, who ran away from his ship at this port. He, probably, mistook the trap for the entrance to a camp and, on creeping in, sprung the fatal drop.

PICKED UP.—We omitted to mention the following in our last issue:—Two men named Joseph Cohen and Henry Blanchard who, while absent from their vessel in a lorry on the Banks off St. Peter's, on the 20th ult., became separated from the lorry and, after being five days and five nights without food, were picked up by the Norwegian barque *Industria* and brought to this port. They were sent to Halifax by J. R. Snowball, Esq., French Consul, on arrival here.

MIRAMICHI CHECKER.—On Monday evening a meeting of the members of the Miramichi Cricket Club was held at the office of Dr. J. B. Benson, Major Morris, Captain, occupying the chair.

The Secretary-Treas. stated he had made enquiries as to the prices of Cricket stock as directed, and read price lists, to which it appeared that those of Messrs. Della Torre & St. John were the most reasonable.

The Secretary then read the names of eleven new members who were proposed, including that of R. E. McKee, Esq., as honorary member. These were duly elected.

The committee on by-laws reported that they had framed the rules on the basis of those of the Fredericton Club.

### St. Andrew's Church.

At a meeting of the Presbytery of Miramichi held in St. Andrew's Church last Tuesday afternoon, the resignation of the Rev. Wm. Wilson, the esteemed and popular pastor of that Church, was considered. The Hon. Wm. Muirhead, L. J. Tweedie, Esq., M. P., P., and W. S. Loggie Esq., appeared as Commissioners for the interests of the congregation. They represented the deep regret of the congregation on account of Mr. Wilson's resignation and their desire for the continuance of his pastorate amongst them. The members of the Presbytery also expressed their deep sorrow at parting with a brother so beloved, so popular a preacher and pastor, and so active and efficient a co-pastor as Mr. Wilson, one member, in speaking of the fact that during a ministry of ten years in St. Andrew's Church Mr. Wilson's acceptability as a preacher, did not wane, said that this was a proof of a good head and a noble heart. He held that sooner or later preachers and people found that the most effective sermons must be permeated by the heart as well as by the brains of the preacher. The good preacher must have a good, tender, sympathetic heart.

Mr. Wilson however, while thanking with deep emotion, the Commissioners and Presbytery for their kind words, urged the acceptance of his resignation. With great reluctance the following motion was made by Rev. J. Anderson seconded by Rev. S. Houston and adopted:—

"That this Presbytery, yielding to Mr. Wilson's adherence to his mission, receive with deep regret and express their sense of the loss of his departure will be to the congregation, to the Presbytery, and to the Church generally—that the usual certificates be granted to him, that a committee composed of Messrs. Muirhead and Moderator, the seconder to be Mr. Wilson, to draw out a minute regarding Mr. Wilson, and that his resignation take effect on the 1st of July next."

We are quite sure that the regret of the Presbytery and congregation are shared by the community generally.

During the evening it was announced by the Chairman, that the Executive Committee had appointed the Rev. Mr. McKee and Mr. Wm. Sinclair to attend the Convention at Fredericton on the 24th, and that a special entertainment would be given to defray their expenses. The Chairman then read the Act of Incorporation of the Chatham Dutch Temperance Reformers' Temple Company, formed for the purpose of erecting a Hall, capital stock \$5000 with power to increase to \$8000 in \$5.00 shares.

On motion of Mr. William Johnston, seconded by Mr. James McKay it was ordered that the directors be appointed.

The following gentlemen were then elected directors:—Mr. Sinclair, Wm. Murray, John Shirreff, W. Johnston, I. B. Oakes, L. J. Tweedie, B. Stapledon, D. Davidson, E. A. Strang.

After some discussion—It was resolved that the drafting of the By-laws of the Company be left to the directors.

It was also resolved that the directors report with reference to By-laws at the meeting to be held on the second Tuesday in June.

In answer to questions about the site and amount of stock taken, Mr. W. Murray stated that the stock subscribed amounted to \$14,000, and that there were many eligible sites available, but that the Committee appointed for that purpose had not yet reported.

#### The Threabare Subject.

MIRAMICHI MAY 11, 1878.

To the Editor of the *Miramichi Advance*.

SIR:—In the last issue of your paper I see a communication over the name of "Observer" in answer to a letter written by the Rev. Mr. McKee. It is plainly to be seen by the tenor of the communication the source from whence it came, and I ask a short space in your paper to answer a few of the points brought up by "Observer". It is not my intention to take up the low and ungentlemanly attack made on the Rev. Mr. McKee by "Observer", for if that gentleman sees fit he is quite able to defend himself.

I am not aware who "Observer" is but rumor says he is one of the Rev. gentlemen appointed on that committee to investigate the Ecclesiac Church affair, but surely it cannot be the case; if so I am sure "Observer" needs the prayers and sympathy of all good men. I will just take up a few of the points "Observer" has tried to make and then leave it to the

public to decide if he is right or wrong. The first point "Observer" has tried to make seems to be the key of all the trouble in connection with the Ecclesiac Church, it is simply this, that the Methodist Presbytery for their consent to do so. This, Mr. Editor, seems to be where the shoe pinches a certain body of so-called Christians. Let me ask "Observer" what special claim the Presbyterian body has on that section of the County. Have they got a life lease of it for the common or do they claim it as a hereditary right, handed down from past generations?

They claim the Methodist trespassing on the field of other denominations. It was too long, Mr. Editor, the people of Ecclesiac were under other denominations, and thus they seized the first opportunity that offered of bettering their spiritual condition. If "Observer" claims that Ecclesiac is under their special care and that it is their special ground, I think he should, as one of the committee that was down to Ecclesiac, when he arrived home, have looked himself up in some room and got down on his bended knees with hands extended to heaven shed bitter tears of repentance and asked the Lord to forgive them for the way they neglected that special part of the country that was under their care. The next point Mr. Editor, that this charitable and Christian "Observer" tries to make is that considerable sums were subscribed by the people of Ecclesiac and elsewhere for the purpose of erecting a *bona fide* Union Church. No doubt such was the case, but the people of Ecclesiac knew too well how they had been neglected in the past, and feeling confident they had nothing else to expect in the future from the other denominations, after careful consideration concluded to deed it to the Methodist Conference, and I might just here say, if that Revd. Committee had stated the facts connected with their mission to Ecclesiac, instead of the glaring mistakes they did not make, nor were there would have been no more need of a *bona fide* correspondence. When said committee asked the question at the meeting they called at Ecclesiac, if the people had the same business to do over again would they do the same thing, and the committee know the answer they received unanimously from all present, that they would drive home the nail they struck so well on the head before. Now I really consider that answer should be sufficient to convince these Revd. gentlemen, that the people were satisfied and did not thank them for their interference.

Again, Mr. Editor, in sec. 6 of that wonderful article of "Observer" he displays all the ugliness and all the spleen his puny mind is capable of showing, and very little of that christian charity which should emanate from a well wishing body of a mixed community, but directly charges a large intelligent, christian body with dishonesty. Now, Mr. Editor, I consider this is carrying the thing too far it is an old adage and a true one that people who live in glass houses should not throw stones. What about that Union Church at Douglastown? Was it not generally understood that it was to be a union church? Did not all Protestant denominations subscribe more or less towards it with that understanding? But who claims it and monopolises it? Surely the Presbyterians—and then talk of glaring dishonesties! Poor "Observer!" The people of Ecclesiac must have treated him very cool otherwise he would not be so wrathful, and now, in conclusion, I would just tell "Observer" that the people of Ecclesiac intend holding special prayers for that committee to ask the Lord to forgive them for the mistakes and falsehoods they publish as facts, and also ask him before he writes again to make himself better acquainted with the people some of the members of the county.
