Any person who objects that his own real or personal property or income is over valued may then appeal to the Board of valuators in writing, who, on receiving such objections shall set aside a day for their consideration. After this the assessment list is completed and filed with the clerk of the

As not only the Parish and County rates but also the District school assessment is levied from the assessors' valuation it is important that it be properly made up, and that any errors in the appraisement &c., be corrected before the list goes out of the assessors' hands.

A despatch dated London, March 24th, states the English Naval Training ship Eurydice capsized off Dunrose Head at half past four o'clock that afternoon, in a sudden squall. One boy and a seaman were

Other advices indicate that between 300 and 400 lives were lost. The Admiral, on receiving news of the disaster, immediately despatched a stramer to the scene of the wreck. The Eurydice was a training ship for ordinary seamen and was under the command of Capt. Marcus A. S. Hare .-She was a sixth rate, 921 tons, and carried

Another despatch states that all hands were mustering for prayers on deck at the time of the disaster. It is believed that the Eurydice had about 320 officers and seamen, which 270 were young men in train-
