Naval and Military Activity.

The London Standard of 7th inst., says the Field Marshall Commanding in Chief visited Woolwich on the morning of the 6th inst.arriving by train shortly before eleven. He was accompanied by General Radcliffe, R. A. Deputy Adjutant Gen'l, and was received by Sir. Charles d'Aguilar Commandant of the Woolwich District: Colonel King, Deputy Quartermaster General; Colonel Markham, Deputy Adjutant General at Woolwich; and other officers of the Staff. The Duke wore plain clothes, and his visit being regarded as a private one no Royal salute was fired. On reaching the Royal Artillery Barracks the recruits of the garrison, the special objects of the visit, were found drawn up for inspection, forming a line of considerable length. The recruits were all of less than twelve months' service, and comprised men of the Royal Horse Artillery Field Batteries, Garrison Artillery, Infantry Brigade Depots, and Rifle Brigade. The Artillery gunners, being of a higher standard than the infantry men, made a good show; but in point of numbers the recuits of the 3d Battalion Rifle Brigade largely preponderated. His Royal Highness made a close inspection of the young men, as he had previously done at Aldershot, and was on the whole pleased with their appearance. He then proceeded to the camp on Woolwick-common in order to see the progress which is being made by the Remount Establishment, under Colonel Pipon, to furnish additional horses for artillery and transport duties. A great many horses are being trained for regimental transport duties, and will be ready for the regiments requiring them as soon as its transport organization is complete. Many men belonging to various corps are now at Woolwich service, and to-day detachments of the Coldstream Guards and Scots Guards, each commanded by an officer, will arrive in garrison for a similar course of instruction. Having visited the new stabling in course of erection, the Duke of Cambridge rode down to the War Department Depot at the Dockyard, and witnessed the active preparations there in progress. The new platforms of the branch railway engaged his particular attention, and perfect provision appeared to be making for a number of trains to be received in the Dockyard and loaded at one time if required. The Duke then returned to London. The War Department have ordered their broker to buy 3000 tons of oats, most of which will be stored at Wool-

ing on the 27th February, says :- The war telegrams continue to be of the most conflicting description. As to news concerning our own naval and military movements, great care is taken at headquarters that very little leaks out until things have taken place. I know, however, that every preparation has been made here by both the naval and military department to be ready for any emergency. Large quantities of biscuit L ET CONSUMPTIVES READI have been baked in the naval bakeries for the troops; large quantities of shot and shell have been received, as well as small arm ammunition; the forts have all been got into a state for active service, and shields rapidly put into their places. Constant drilling and parades of the troops take place; large stocks of coal have been laid in, and provision made in the way of quarters for additional troops. The newly-arrived regiments—the 1st and 61st—have settled down in their quarters, and the garrison affairs go on quietly.-The ships of the Channel Squadron arrived here on the morning of the 27th. They wait for orders. It is not yet known

SMOKING WHILE AT WORK .- There are three good reasons why workmen should not smoke while at work, namely, it reduces the physical energy by the very sense of relaxation which it imparts; it often causes the smoker to stop work altogether until his pipe is out and it is dangerous. We do not believe that any man can properly see what he is about with a cloud of smoke and gas rising into his eyes, neither can he bestow his full attention on what he has to do, when the pipe must be kept going at the same time. It may be said that even if he stops for a few puffs no harm will be done. Perhaps not so far as one man is concerned, but if all the men in a large concern stop for puffs, the aggregate sum of the stoppages will amount to considerable time lost. correspondent writes us to say that he recently timed the smokes taken in a day by twelve journeymen painters, who were engaged on a job requiring special haste. The total number of minutes footed up over a quarter of a day's work, and the employer soon discovered that he could not afford any such loss, and promptly forbade the practice. Not long ago we saw carpenters smoking in an unfinished house while putting in the woodwork. The floors were littered with shavings, and large quantities of other conbustible matter were lying about. The accidental dropping of a few sparks from one of the pipes might easily have determined a serious conflagration. If smoking must be practised, it is much better to confine the indulgence to off-work hours. -Scientific American.



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

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
