

Messrs. J. & A. McMillan's New Establishment.

From the St. John Globe.

One of the most conspicuous buildings on the east side of Prince William street, in the block between Princess and Church streets, is that which contains the extensive establishment-including the retail and wholesale bookstore, the bindery and the printing office-of Messrs. J. & A. McMillan. The appearance of the building from Prince William street is very attractive. The front is laid up from Philadelphia pressed brick with bold and finely varied details of native sandstone and galvanized iron sanded in imitation the stone employed, the lines of the window heads presenting graceful curves, and the cornice being bold and massive. The red brick of the front has a few

the retail store to which we shall refer On Prince William street the building fronts 30 feet 6 inches, and runs back 120 feet. The foundation is of the most solid Dwelling Houses, whether built rin course of character. A line of stone banded brick piers two feet square, resting solid rock base, carry the line of iron and wooden columns from basement to roof which form the central support. brick walls of the superstructure have been erected in a first class manner from good material and in every respect as strong and substantial as they could be made. The structure is four stories high, exclusive of a nine feet basement below the street level-the height of the stories respectively being 15 feet, 12 feet, 11 feet and 10 feet. The basement is vaulted perfectly dry, lighted with a double line of floor panes of hammered English glass, one inch thick and two by three feet. It has also light from the front. Here will be stowed the heavy stock-such as printing paper, inks, slates, etc. Here, too, is the steam boiler for heating the premises, and here also is the first story

> From the street we enter the principal floor-the rez de chaussee-which is devoted to the general retail trade in books, stationery and such fancy articles as are peculiar to the stationery trade. The inside measurement of the store is 27 feet by 117 feet. It is lighted on the street by a lofty open front filled with polished English plate glass, the windows on either | W. Spears, of New York; the carpentry side being remarkably clear and bold, the doors high and graceful, and over them in chaste gilt finish is the name of the firm, etc.; in the rear are several large windows; and the central light is from a dome eleven feet square, extending from the second floor to a point six feet above the roof, affording a brilliant flood of light. This dome is so arranged as to ventilate each of the stories-the shaft being closed with glazed sashes hung so as to swing out at the bottom affording access to the interior, so that the cords of the ventilators above may be reached, or a freer circulation of air given. The gallery in the first ceiling immediately under the dome is very handsomely decorated with walnut drapery, laid on a white back ground, with massive newels adorned with pendents moulded square, and with heavy moulded rail and balusters.

The fourth flat is the composing and press room, probably the finest in Canada. The machinery is driven by a fine engine made by Burrill & Johnson, of Yarmouth, the power being supplied from an upright tubular boiler. There are large and small power presses in several styles and sizes of different makes, including Hoe, Peerless and other well known makes-all of these being in the rear portion of the story, whilst on Prince William street front are the printers with an almost unlimited supply of imposing stones, racks,

The entire building is heated by steam, The general effect of the front is greatly low pressure, direct radiation, with a 25heightened by the splendid plate glass of horse power tubular boiler, placed as we have said in the cellar. The heat is distributed on all the upper floors by lines of steam pipe, passing around the outside walls, and in the first story by circular radiators around the base of the columns, with ornate tops finished in bronze and they are very rich and stylish. The system of ventilation-a very important accessory, so often wholly neglected even in tine buildings-is here quite complete. Besides the general ventilation obtained at the light dome, ventilating flues descend through all the walls to the cellar or basement floors once in about ten feet for the discharge of foul and impure, air which is generated to a great extent in close rooms from the chemicals employed in the manufacture of paper, especially of the heavier and coarser kinds. There are also two large flues for ventilation, communicating with each floor, provided with artificial inductors, that afford a positive ventilation to whatever may be the temperature or condition of the external
