W. H. T. Sumner was put upon the stand to prove that the Osbornes paid him money for house building on Oct. 15th and Jan. 7th.

John A. Humphrey, M. P. P., testified to having received moneys from the Osborne family for lumber for the house previously referred to. He did not know where Osborne got the money; he had dunned him for it.

Mrs. Osborne said it was late when he came back, that he wanted liquor and she would not give it to him. She said Mc-Carthy then produced a flask of brandy from his pocket and said he had some of his own. The witness said this was all he remembered of the conversation in which he took only a minor part, saying "yes or no" as occasion required.
