Our Lumber Export.

The last cargo of lumber, for the present season, has been shipped from the Miramichi to Great Britain, and, as usual, we give the total tonnage and shipments for the year. They are as follows:—

We have included in the above, under the head of "deals" the following:—deals and battens, scantling, ends, and boards.

The total Miramichi shipments for the year 1878 under each heading is as follows:—

The Miramichi exports, besides a relative proportion of palings, etc., the falling off of our export for the season of 1878, compared with the previous one being nearly one third.

Miramichi has, therefore, done her share towards reducing the excessive lumber supply in foreign markets.

An Apology.

The readers of the ADVANCE will, no doubt, regret to observe that Northumberland is again thrown into a new political excitement by a number of friends of the Montreal gentleman who recently ran an unsuccessful election here.

When the late contest had been decided at the polls the local public hoped it was over and that anything which might have arisen during its progress to mar the harmony of personal, social or business relationships between members of the respective parties, would soon be forgotten.

It was hoped that the energies and talents of our people would be allowed to find employment in fighting the battles of business and every day life, which in these hard times require men's best efforts.

But a few persons who pride themselves on the money they have acquired and who trust to luck to obtain more, have taken the responsibility of throwing the torch of discord among us.

As the local paper representing the dominant party the ADVANCE is thus forced to undertake the unpleasant task of giving public expression to the spirit in which the conduct of Mr. Mitchell and his friends, in making wholesale charges of bribery, etc., is received.

It is a natural thing for those who are attacked to defend themselves, and while we would prefer to do the more accented and legitimate work of a public journal, we shall not shrink from devoting such attention to these enemies of the County as the party we represent may think they require.

The quarrel is forced upon us by men who have always endeavored to conciliate, believing that there was less of real malice behind their conduct than now appears.

We therefore, apologize for taking our coal of before our well-bred readers, but we must join our County friends in the fight they are called upon to make.

The Gladstone Exploration Company.

The ADVANCE, in the course of a casual reference to Mr. Gladstone, intimated that he was in his "second childhood" and, as a matter of course, the friends of the person who, as we showed, borrowed one of the Rt. Hon. gentleman's most insane ideas and made a point of it in the "Sun," held up their hands in holy horror at our presumption in giving expression to what we believe is intelligent public sentiment in reference to the English ex-Premier.

Why don't these same critics condemn some of the leading wits of England for the following, which we find in the Toronto Mail:

An excellent sketch of Mr. Gladstone has been published in the shape of a prospectus of a company to be called the Gladstone Exploration Company (Limited); capital £20,000, in 7,500 preferred shares of £10 each, and 300 deferred shares of £10 each, of which the 7,500 preferred shares are now offered to the public.

The directors, bankers, &c., having been given, it is stated that "a contract has been entered into with the Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone, M. P., for the purpose of taking over himself with all his accomplishments, faculties, acquisitions, attainments, achievements, reputation, impulses, articles of virtue, earnestness, convictions, and good-will, in consideration of an annual payment, for his use and behoof, to the Board of Trustees of a sum not exceeding Twenty Thousand Pounds in sterling money of Great Britain and Ireland, for whom such sum this Company will enjoy an exclusive and absolute lease of the Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone, M. P., with all his above-mentioned attributes and appurtenances, in good working order and condition."

The annual payment to be calculated as follows: £20,000 to trustee's personal maintenance of the Right Hon. gentleman, £3,000 offices, fees, secretary's salary, postage, etc., £25,000. The income to be derived from the following among other sources:—Sentation articles, £2,500 per annum; post-cards and autographs, £1,250; speeches; £5,200; theological attentances, £2,000;

classical labours, £1,000; chips (struck from trees felled by the Rt. Hon. gentleman), £100; speeches on presentation of cheap articles, such as a stick or an axe, £3,200; charges for witnessing the presentation of a key, once a week to ten thousand people at least £26,000; a total, £49,750, which would leave, after deduction of paid-out, a net income of £28,725, or £118,125.

We commend the above to the political and literary critics of the "Sun" as a hint which may suggest to them the prudence of informing themselves in some degree on current public opinion in reference to the (to them) "unknown gods" whom they "ignorantly worship".

And if they will dabble in declining human stock, they should also realise the necessity of keeping posted in reference to the specimens in political life who though dead "yet speak".

Election Petition.

On Thursday evening last at five o'clock a copy of the following document was served upon J. B. Snowball, Esq., M. P., by Saml. Thompson Esq., Q. C., of Newcastle.

IN THE SUPREME COURT. "The Dominion Controverted Election Act, 1874."

Election for the Electoral District of the County of Northumberland held on the seventeenth of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight.

The Petition of Robert R. Call, of the Parish of Newcastle, in the said County of Northumberland, and Timothy W. Crocker, of Newcastle, in the County of Northumberland, addressed, and R. P. Whitney of the Parish of Northesk, in the said County of Northumberland, and John Sadler of the Parish of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, whose names are subscribed.

1. Your petitioners are persons who had a right to vote, and did vote at the above election.

Your Petitioners state that the said Election was held on the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, when Peter Mitchell and Jabez Bunting Snawball, Esquires, were Candidates, and the Returning Officer has returned the said Jabez Bunting Snawball, as being duly elected.

The Petition, however, was not filed until the 23rd, but Mr. Mitchell and his friends, having forwarded it, were doubtless anxious to confirm their assurances given to almost everybody as to what they would do, and they therefore, said the protest was entered before it really was.

Next to Mr. Mitchell the person most interested in the Petition is, we believe, Senator Muirhead of Chatham, as he has openly assured dozens of people on both sides of politics that he was bound to have his "revenge out of Snowball if it took him twenty years", and he, probably, prides himself on his share of the proceedings and will fail in no possible effort which may tend to the success of the protest.

Indeed many persons believe that were it not for Senator Muirhead no petition would have been filed. That gentleman's peculiarities have been overlooked in the community to so great an extent that he appears to assume the right to say and do what he pleases in reference to his fellow-citizens and, at the same time, enjoy immunity from retaliation.

We submit that his position as a prominent public man requires that people should know just where he stands in reference to this petition business and, therefore, place him next to Mr. Mitchell, in whose interest he would set the whole community by the ears, keep alive the little animosities which grow out of the late political canvass and prevent those who were political opponents from being, as they ought to be, personal friends.

After Mr. Mitchell and Senator Muirhead, as persons who have taken their political defeat with very bad grace are the men whose names appear in the Petition, viz., Robert R. Call and Timothy W. Crocker of Newcastle, Robert P. Whitney and John Sadler are petitioners and Jabez Bunting Snawball is respondent.
