How Russians Batho.

We in the United States use the Russian vapor bath as a medicinal agent only. But in the life of the Russian peasant it plays a most important part. No orthodox peasant will enter a church until he has cleansed himself physically by means of the bath. After laboring among pollutions for six and a half days in the week, he devotes Saturday afternoon to the vapor bath, and carefully avoids thereafter all pollution until he has performed his devotions at the morning service on Sunday. Some of the peasants take their vapor bath in the household oven, in which the bread is baked. Others resort to the rublic bath owned by the village. Strange to say, notwithstanding their scrupulous care in this particular, some of their habits are absolutely filthy. While bathing, the degree of heat which they endure would kill a person not accustomed to it from childhood. And in winter they often rush out of the bath and roll themselves in the snow. Such rapid transitions from extreme leat to extreme cold illustrates a common Russian proverb, which says that what is health to the Russian is death to the German. As the old proverb hath it, "One man's meat is another man's poison."

SLEEP THE BEST STIMULANT. - The best possible thing for a man to do when he feels too weak to carry his work through is to go to bed and sleep for a week if he can. This is the only true recuperation of power, the only actual recuperation of brain force, because during the sleep the brain is in a state of rest, and in a cond tion to receive and appropriate particles nutriment from the blood which tak those which have been consumed in vious labor, since the very act of thinking consumes, burns up solid particles as every turn of the wheel or screw of the splendid steamer is the result of consumption by fire of the fuel in the furnace. THE BRITISH ARMY. - Major-General Sir Garnet Wolseley in a contribution to the Nineteenth Century, entitled " England as a Military Power," says :- "At no previous period has England been so strong clared 400,000 drilled men would fall into · line if required, supported by three hundred and seventy-two field guns, manned by Royal Artillery. That number would army at home. 99,000; army and militia reserve, 40,000; militia, 80,000; volunteers, 180,000; and second-class army reserve, 10,000. I have put the figures very low, and have left out altogether 10,000 yeomanry available for home service, and regular troops available for war when the Mediterranean garrisons were furnished by militia. When I compare the military strength of England with what it was in 1854, I am amazed at the conditions of military weakness and helplessness in which we were when we began the Russian war of that year, as I am at the ignorance of those who are now croaking over our supposed want of strength, and alleged coursequent mability to fight."

It is folly for one who can't succeed at anything else to try newspaper publishing. To publish a newspaper requires the skill, position, boldness, vigilance and strategy of a commander in chief; and to edit a newspaper requires | 7 that one be a statesman, essayist, geographer, statistician, and encyclopediac. To govern and propel a newspaper until it shall be a fixed institution and a national fact demands more qualities than any business on earth. The rare combinations of such elements made a James Gordon Bennet, a Horance Greeley, a Henry J. Raymond, a William Cullen Bryant, and a Samuel Bowles. What is true of the secular press is true of the religious press. It is very often the case that a minister who can't get anybody to hear him will start a religious paper. Receipt for making an ordinary editorial in a religious newspaper-Cut a dry sermon into ten parts, and add a pint of skim milk and a gallon of water, sweeten with ipecac."

CANADIAN HORSES IN ENGLAND. - Bell's Life of February 2nd has the following :-"The Canadians are evidently determined to make this trade only second in important to that of live cattle. It is estimated that nearly 3,000 Canadian horses have been exported to Europe during the last few years, and these shipments are to be vastly supplemented during the coming season. Last spring a special sale of 600 horses, selected to suit this market, was held at Toronto. This was attended with such marked success that three sales are being arranged to take place this spring, commencing at Toronto on the 9th, 10th, and 11th of April, when 500 horses will be offered, 500 more at Hamilton on the 16th. 17th, and 18th of April, and another 500 at London on the 23rd, 24th, and 25th of April. As all these cities are only about 40 miles apart, and situated in the Province of Ontario, one of the best horse breeding districts on the American continent, they must offer great advantages to buyers. In the advance of regular horse fairs in Canada similar to those held in this country, it is confidently expected that these sales will supply this deficiency. and afford English buyers a better opportamity than has heretofore existed of selecting suitable horses for this market without having to scour the country. As an instance of the superior quality of the PHYSICIAN AND SURGEON, Canadian horse, a pair of bay carriage horses sold by auction in Glasgow a few days ago to Mr. Coat's, Woodside House, Paisley, for 320gs., a Canadian trotter realised 320gs., 280gs. were refused for a pair of cobs, and a very large number of these horses have been sold by Messrs. Lucas & Co., of Liverpool, at high prices. More than one witness examined before Lord Rosebery's committee gave testimony to the valuable qualities of the Canadian horse. Col. Soame Jenyns told the Prince MR. of Wales, who took great interest in his examination that "Canadian horses are fairly bred and make excellent hacks, where he intends to reside.




