STANLEY AND LIVINGSTONE ANTICI-PATED.—A novel discovery has been made in the library of Lyons, in France. It is a map of the entire system of the central plateau of Africa, which has been of late years explored by Grant, Baker, Livingstone and Stanley. The system is traced upon a globe which was onstructed in 1701, and contains in detail the sources of the Nile and the Congo. The map was executed by order of Father Placide de Saint Amour, principal of the monastery of the third order of St. Francis, by Crispurien of Toulon, and by the monks of Bonaventure and Gregoire, both connected with the above establishment. The report does not mention the names of the explorers. The modern maps place the source of the two rivers slightly to the northward of that just discovered.

GERMAN STREET SCENES. -- Travellers find the street scenes in German towns peculiar and noticeable. Single cows and oxen are harnessed and worked like horses. One is surprised at the large size and physical strength of the women, who seem to perform the principal portion of the physical labor; while those of their husbands not permantly engaged in smoking and beer drinking, are either soldiers or policemen. Girls and dogs are harnessed together into milk carts, and horses are harnessed to a single pole, in place of being between two shafts. The women, as a rule, are not beautiful, nor even comely. Undoubtedly there are pretty Marguerites, hidden away somewhere, with their long braids of blonde hair, but they certainly do not much abound. On the other hand, there are to be found very few beggars or drunken people. An air of thrift surrounds one on all sides.

EFFECT OF LIGHTNING ON A TELE-PHONE. -On Sunday morning, when the sudden flash of lightning was seen, and was followed by a sharp peal of thunder, Dr. John A. Stevens was using the telephone extending from his home on High street to the drug store in the Hotel Capitol. The clerk at the drug stcre had his ear at the tube listening for a communication from the doctor, when, simultaneously with the peal of thunder, he received a severe shock in the ear, the report sounding like the discharge of a gun. His power of hearing was more or less affected all day. Dr. Stevens saw a flash of electricity play about his end of the instrument, and on examination, it was found that the delicate insulated wire had been entirely destroyed by the lightning. Had the doctor been speaking at the tube at the time of the flash, he would probably have been dangerously injured. The owners of the telephone were planning to put lightning arresters on this week, and Sunday's warning will no doubt hasten the precautionary measures. -Hartford Evening Post, March 4.

WHITEWASH FOR POULTRY. - Without a free use of whitewash no poultry breeder can expect to keep his fowls healthy for any length of time, and to NT a neglect of this can be attributed many of the disappointments and much of the loss experienced by amateurs, who do not realise, until they have paid dearly for their experiences, that cleanliness is one of the first principles of success in poultry keeping, and that lime, in different forms, is an invaluable agent in D promoting cleanliness in poultry houses and amongst fowl. Where it can be done, without too much expense, we would advise persons, in building their poultry houses to use planed boardsat least, planed on the inside-in preference to rough ones, for it is far easier to keep the fowl house clean when smooth boards are used, while the lice | and other vermin cannot so readily find a lodging-place. As a preventive is cheaper and better than a cure, we would advise those who build a poultry | A house to give it a good whitewashing, both inside and out, before the fowls are let inside. To make the whitewash still more distasteful to the vermin which have such a fancy for poultry, mix a small quantity of carbonic acid with the wash, stir it well till it disaolves, snd then apply. It is not injurious to the fowls, but is to vermin, and at the same time is a deodorizer and desinfectant .- N. Y Independent.

THE NEW LONDON FASHIONS .- A very new handsome shape for dresses is called the Queen Elizabeth bodice. It is very high at the back, forming a high collar at the neck; in front it is very low, and square; the sleeves are puffed, and come down to the elbow; the bodice reminds one much of the dresses worn in Charles IX.'s time, or of the costumes of the Holbein portraits. A chemisette of crape lisse, or tulle, or embroidered muslin is worn with this new bodice; a new ornament at the side of the cut-out bodice is a small humming bird, arranged with lace. The linen drapers show a great many

novelties in dinner-napkins and tablecloths; the borders are embroidered. and then fringed, either with imitations of coloured Russian embroidery, or English open-work embroidery; for afternoon or evening tea, or for breakfast, these fancy linen novelties look very well. I find, that the first dinner-cloths used by the Romans were made of wool, under the Emperors of Rome; linen, and also silk, embroidered with gold and silver, were the fashion, according to "La Mosaique." It was only after Augustus, that the host offered napkins to the guests; before his time, the invited company brought their napkins with them. The chief reason for changing this custom was, that the slaves who took them back were aften suspected of stealing, and carrying off valuables with the soiled linen. Before the use of napkins at feasts, in Rome, a wet sponge was pas-sed round after eating and bread-crumbs were used for drying the fingers; these latter were thrown to the dogs.




