Parliamentary Humour.

(Ottawa correspondence of the St. John Globe.)

The people of New Brunswick who were so greatly honored by the event, will not have forgotten that at a former session of Parliament, one of their number, the member for Kings's, was presented with a medal, a costly and recherche affair, made of the leaden cover of an inkstand and chastely engraved with a motto in Latin from the penknife of Sir Francis Hincks, and adorned with a goodly loop of red tape from which it could be suspended to decorate the member for King's aforesaid. It cannot be doubted that such tokens of consideration and regard from the members of Western constituencies toward a Maritime representative have done very much to perpetuate kindly relations between the different Provinces of Canada,

and to cement the union in indissoluble This much by way of preface for the story of an event that occurred the other day. It will be remembered that the member for Northumberland has greatly distinguished himself during the session by the number of speeches he has made upon the various subjects that have been before the House. But there has been one subject more than any other upon which the hon. member has particularly laid himself out, so to speak, and has from time to time and for many times, expended the full force of his matchless oratory. Henceforth this old constellation must be known as Taurus Minor, while Northumberland's roarer takes his place in the firmament as Taurus Major. It would have been strange, indeed, if the distinguished efforts of the hon.

member to give imperishable fame to the memory of the slaughtered bovine should not have been appreciated and elicited marks of approval in some quarter. To the everlasting disgrace of the Commons of Canada be it said that some of its members with a moral turpitude that does discredit to humanity, and with a dullness of intellect that affords a strange commentary upon our representative institutions, gave but an indifferent hearing to the orator, had utterly failed to perceive the overshadowing importance of the subject.
