Needs Investigation.

A Northesk correspondent of th Advocate, who appears to write solely with a view of securing protection of the CASE OF COW STEALING. - Yesterday bass fisheries in that Parish says :-

"I am not posted as to the quantity the lifferent seines may have taken, but one in particular I am credibly informed, has taken nine puncheons full of small and almost worthless bass, besides the large number that were sold in Newcastle and elsewhere of spawning fish." Our contemporary, instead of dealing fairly with the complaint, says

"The people of the North West know full well that the Mackenzie Gov't is responsible for the destruction of bass this season by seining, as the seining was again allowed after having been abolished by the same Gov't., for the sole purpose of helping their candidate, Mr. Snowball."

It is fair to all parties to state that the Mackenzie Government prohibited seining in the Parish of Northesk, entirely, owing to the river being too narrow to admit of even gaspereaux being taken without endangering other fish. It is also provided in the Regulation that the capture of bass in seines in either the Northwest or Southwest river shall be punishable by seizure of the seines engaged in such illegal work. If, therefore, the complaint of the correspondent is well-founded it is the Advocate's duty to assist in exposing the person complained of with a view of having him punished, and the officer in whose district such illegal work was carried on ought also to be brought to book for what appears to be a gross neglect of duty. It is both silly and wicked to publish manifest misrepresentations of the Government, whose worstsin in Northumberland is retaining in office quite a large number of persons who are either untit for the discharge of their duties or too willing to assist the enemies of the Government in misrepresenting its policy in respect of our fisheries.
