It is not for those who have labored for so many years, and with too much success, to persuade the people that prosperity can be made or restored by Act of Parliament, to complain or be surprised if their pupils attribute to misgovernment and bad legislation all the evils from which this Province now suffers. but those who always told the people the truth have no hesitation in repeating now, that no Act of the Canadian Parliament could increase the price of lumber in the the foreign markets, or cause an improvement in the freights of ships employed in the trade of the world, and, therefore, that we must wait with patience for the oper ation of the causes which will bring us better prices and better freights; but it would be folly to suppose, as the News wishes us, that the present depression of St. John is due altogether to the low price of lumber and the low rate of freights. and the consequent decline in shipbuilding, or that this depression will wholly pass away when prices of lumber, and rates of freight improve. One of its own correspondents, who calls himself "Repeal," pointed out another cause and the manufacturers of St. John people even of this Province to the same extent as formerly. Instead of our manufacturing for the Upper Provinces, as many of our people were foolishly led to facture for us to a large extent. They send us boots, woollen cloths, cotton cloths, cutanails, clothing, agricultural implements, etc., etc., supplying to a very great extent, the country storekeepers who formerly made all their purchases in St. John, and selling largely even in St. John itself, at the very doors

no longer supply the wants of the of our merchants and manufacturers. Of the imported goods also, such as country traders bought formerly in St. John, great part is now supplied to them by the merchants of the Upper Province. It is for this reason, as much as because of the low price of deals, and low rates of now partly or wholly idle, and so many of our wholesale houses are embarrassed? How is all this to be changed? Courage, and fortitude, and hope, all excellent in their way, will not enable our merchants to overcome the competition against which they have struggled so bravely in vain; and to assume that our manufacturers can make better use of any means at their disposal, or of any advantages position gives them, is to say that if the competition with the manufacturers of the Upper Provinces has crippled or crushed them, the fault is their own.
