It is very desirable also to consider the bearing of a prosperous export trade, free from onerous burdens on the consuming powers of the people. THE FINANCE MINISTER SPENDS A DAY IN

QUEBEC. QUEBEC, Dec. 9.—Sir Leonard Tilley arrived here to-day in search of a hum, but after a hurried visit to the factories which still linger in the ancient capital he left this evening for Levis, and will take the Intercolonial Railway train tomorrow in search for some more booming locality. Sir Leonard was accompanied on his rounds by a number of trusty friends, and by the Mayor, who introduced him to the leading manufacturers. The highly intelligent M. P.'s for Dorchester and Portneuf, Messrs. Rouleau and Vallee, were of the party. The Finance Minister visited the following factories in order :- Hossack presser; Withall's rubber factory; Lemesurier's tobacco factory; Vallier's cabinet factory; Drum, cabinet factory; Emonds' tool-making shop; Breese, Migner & Fortin, and Contant's boot and shoe factories;

Germain's tannery; and Boswell's brewery.

At Hossack & Woods' but few men were

working, all the machinery being motionless. The proprietors informed Sir Leonard that they would like to see the West India trade developed that a foreign market might be opened. Mr. Withall had but 50 or 60 men employed, and complained that the duties on raw goods not made in Canada, such as fine felts, were too high. Drum's cabinet factory is in course of liquidation, and is working on short time reducing stocks, so Sir Tilley congratulated the manager on the cheapness of his goods and the excellence of his machinery. Lemesurier's tobacco factory is active, but the Finance Minister was careful not to seek to make comparisons between the present business and the amount done before the bringing forth of the National Policy. Mr. Lemesurier complained of the high duty charged on native tobacco and on the amount of illicit manufacture carried on. At Vallier's an immense stock was shown, but no machinery was in motion. The proprietor was satisfied, however, with the 35 per cent. tariff, and has an order from the new Tory Government to make a new chair for Hon. Dr. Ross, as each retiring president of the Legislative Council carries away his own chair. The Province would be glad to give all the members of that fossilized House their chairs if they would consent to take them away and never come back. At Emonds' only two hands were at work in the whole factory. The excuse made was that the factory had been stopped to take stock. Woodley's immense shoe factory is now closed up, so it was not visited. Peters' saw mill was not running to-day either, and though on the programme was not taken in. In Breesc's factory the hon. Finance Minister pulled a wry face as he noticed the walls covered with woodcuts of Hon. Mr. Laurier, put up by the operatives, who are amongst his electors. In another large shoe factory a few hands were at work, and crowds of men were sitting idling in another part of the building, who, it was stated, were waiting till work was made ready for a hum, but who nevertheless were not regular employees.
