Gloucester, Feby. 10, 1879. MR. EDITOR :- There is not a little wonder in the lower part of Gloucester and Alnwick, after all the threats relating the displacement of A. K. McDougall Esq., from the secretaryship of the Tracadie Lazaretto, that the quarterly meeting of the Board passed off on Monday, 3rd inst., without those who have been promising Mr. McDougall's deposition, doing anything. We had been informed that the Gov't. in Council at Fredericton were contemplating this dismissal and that nothing less would satisfy the hon. Ruler of all things in this Province. Probably, however, some member of the Government feared the responsibility of this unjust and unfair treatment of a respectable and influential voter in Northumberland, for we are now told that this job has been entrusted to the Board of Health -that really and truly honorable body now composed of eleven members! That there are some respectable men on this Board, no one will deny; but some four or five members have been appointed since about as many years and I declare that some of them look more like suspected anna of Elophantinois than members of the Board of Health.
