SCHOOL DEBT. In the evening the Secretary-Treasures read a notice from the Provincial Secretary

relating to the arrearage on the County School Loan and requesting the attention of the Muncipality thereto. In reply to interrogatories, the Secretary-Treasurer said that by paying over the surplus created by the 10 % added to the County assessment, he had gradually reduced the debt to \$1,600. He proposed that after paying the School drafts he should continue, as before, to appropriate any balance left to the liquidation of the amount still due. Coun. Lawler made a motion embodying the Secretary-Treasurer's proposition He referred to the fact that several parishes had not accepted the School Law at first, although they paid a large amount of tax. ation, which went to assist the schools of the other parishes and relieve the local ratepayers. Not only did the parishes which accepted the law receive this benefit at the expense of such parishes as Chatham. but ever since Chatham had accepted the law her proportion of the per capita tax \$29 00 for the support of schools amounted to \$1,000 per year more than she received 3 75 back from the County Fund-showing that there was every justice in the surplus re-2 27 ferred to by the Secretary-Treasurer being 37 50 appropriated as that officer suggested.
