"The Fortune Bay Affair."

Our indefatigable Canadian Fishery Commissioner, W. F. White, Esq., has written a paper on the above subject. It will be remembered that the United States Government made a claim some months since upon the British Government for compensation to a number of United States Fishermen who were obliged by the local authorities of Fortune Bay, Nfld., to discontinue fishing for herrings with purse seines on a Sunday, the mode and time of fishing being both illegal. Some twenty vessels claimed damages at the rate of about \$5,000 each. Mr. White, charged on the arguments of United States Secretary Everts against the award of the Halifax Commission, showing that he was well as Judge Foster and other eminent American authorities contended that the fishermen of that country had practically no rights conferred upon them by the Treaty to do what they now claim damages for being prevented from doing. The Commissioner makes out one of the most conclusive cases possible in favor of the justice of the award and against the inconsistency of the Americans in the whole arbitration matter. The way in which he puts Mr. Everts on the Halifax Commission, in the witness box against Mr. Everts, on the claims of these Gloucester fishermen who want about \$100,000 for a very small fraction of what Senator Edmunds declared to be "practically worthless," shows Mr. White to be a keen and skillful advocate of our treaty rights, and an officer well worthy of the important place he holds in the Fisheries Department. The case and paper referred to will form part appropriate addenda to the Report of the Halifax Fisheries Commission.

Severe Storm. The most severe snow storm of the season visited us on Friday last. The temperature was low and a gale of wind prevailed all day, making the drifts thick and blinding and the snowbanks high. The trains were hung up at various points for a short time, the railway authorities, very properly ordering freight trains to remain at stations during the worst part of the storm in preference to expending the men's energies and assuming the risks of unnecessarily fighting accumulating drifts. Owing to the Chatham road not being clear till Saturday no mails from either east or west were received at the Chatham Post Office until Saturday evening. The snow is reported heavy in the woods.

Ottawa News.

Parliamentary matters move along slowly at Ottawa, although we may expect more activity shortly. The daily sessions are very brief that of Tuesday being only fourteen minutes duration. It is quite evident that it would have been better for the opening to have been delayed a week or two. All classes in Canada must regret the disgraceful conduct described as having been witnessed at Rideau Hall. The individuals who behaved so badly ought to be publicly known and henceforth afforded no opportunity to indulge their beastly propensities to the public disgrace. Our readers will be interested in the news from the Capital, brief as it is. We give the latest and among the items are some of local interest.

The Local Legislature.

The New Brunswick Legislature is to assemble to-day. It is said there will be a contest for the Speakership between Messrs. Stevenson and Vail—the former receiving the support of Members of the Government and personal friends, the latter of gentlemen from both sides, but chiefly of the Opposition. The vote—should a division take place—will hardly be a test of the relative strength of the two parties. It is probable that Mr. Blair will be chosen leader of the Opposition, although this is only conjecture on our part. We have no doubt that unless the Provincial Secretary is hampered by some of his colleagues he will have reforms of administration to present for the consideration of the House. Before these can come up for treatment, however, other questions may precipitate a party conflict. Both sides believe themselves to be the majority, it is said, and old inconsistencies may cause new troubles that will hinder the real and necessary work of the Legislature. We hope nothing will be done hastily and that mistakes may be avoided on both sides.

IN HIS PLACE.—It will be seen by reference to our Ottawa news that Mr. Snowball, who left Chatham for Ottawa on Thursday last, was sworn in and took his seat in the House of Commons on Monday.

ACTIVE POLITICS.—It is reported that the King of Barmah has murdered all the Royal Princes and their families, and reinstated the Ministers formerly in office, thus restoring the previous despotic Government.

FISHERIES REPORT.—Among the Blue Books that have come to hand from Ottawa is the Report of the Marine and Fisheries Department which, like those of other departments shall have more full attention hereafter. It appears that the Fisheries expenditure of the year ending June 30, 1878 was \$93,387.81, under the following heads:—Ontario, \$12,723.88; Quebec, \$13,622.55; Nova Scotia, \$15,292.82; New Brunswick, 10,926.11; Prince Edward Island, 1,836.54; British Columbia, \$699; Manitoba, 299; Fish Breeding 20,088.89; Fisheries protection Steamer \$19,367.11.
