For us, however, a much more important product has now been added to the hitherto known properties of this useful root, a short but interesting account of which is to be found in the Nineteenth Century for May. He feared he might trespass on the discretion the law allowed him, but he would take into consideration, the prisoner's time of life, he would sentence him to be confined in the St. John (?) penitentiary for a term of seven years and that during

that period he should be kept to hard The prisoner was then removed from the dock having been first hand-cuffed, and the court adjourned sine die.
