This is prohibited by regulations made under the authority of the Act and if the proceedings here were for fishing within the close time, the prosecution would undoubtedly have a right to prove the regulation in the way pointed out by the Act, that is by producing a copy of the Canada Gazette containing said regulations, and failing to do that then Mr. Carman's objection would be well founded and the case for the prosecution must fall to the ground, but in this case I find that the Act itself provides that bag nets etc., are prohibited at all times. except under special license.
