Paterson gave an original proof of the 92nd of the Theorems for exercise, Wormell's Geometry, and Miss Kate Loggie demonstrated the law of falling bodies by a geometrical figure on the black board.

THE PRIZES. It was announced that the Trustees had supplied three prizes, and that two additional ones had been provided. The prize for regular attendance was awarded to Miss Maggie Mowat, who had not lost a day during the term.

Mr. Oakes suggesten that, as an entertainment was to be given by the pupils, the following evening in the Masonic Hall, for the purpose of raising money for small cabinet, that occasion would be a good time to distribute the prizes.

Mr. Winslow briefly addressed the pupils, saying he had been pleased with the other schools and the progress in this one was fairly satisfactory. He thought, however, that the children hardly spoke distinctly enough; when they read they should speak plainly. The progress the classes in Geography and Algebra had made was good. He thought that it was the aty of the gentlemen present to speak plainly, as this was a public institution and what was said should be well received by those interested. He had that afternoon observed rudeness on the part of a boy when spoken to by his master. If he noticed it again he should mention his name publicly.

The Rev. Dr. Jardine said he could only express the great pleasure he had felt at being present on this occasion. He was pleased with the progress made by the pupils in Algebra and Arithmetic, which were now taught in the schools by methods which were formerly used in colleges. The pupils now, therefore, enjoyed great advantages in the manner of teaching. But no institution was perfect, and he thought the errors the Latin class had made in pronunciation would hardly have been tolerated in his day. He said Mr. Oakes had stated that he left instruction in pronunciation till the pupils commenced Virgil, but this was a bad plan as it was hard for pupils to get out of bad habits, and scholarship in Latin was greatly judged of, by the accuracy with which it was read. On the whole the pupils were to be congratulated.

The Rev. Mr. McBain said he could only repeat what had been said in connection with other departments; both parents and children should be glad to have such a department as the High School. He had heen unable to be present at Miss Haviland's examination, but, no doubt, The following was the programme :there was considerable improvement. In reference to the High School, he would endorse the remarks already made; as to the Latin class, if the scholars, when they were looking up words, would cast their eyes on the quantity, it would be much better than leaving this matter until they came to verse. He was pleased with their mathematical proficiency and the comparison with their attainments six months ago in this branch, spoke well for them. He hoped the progress they had made in the past would be an encouragement for them in future, and would prove useful to them in after life.

The Rev. Mr. Forsyth said he would simply congratulate the pupils on the great advantages they enjoyed, but he thought they displayed too great a diffidence in answering the questions put to them, but on the whole there was much improvement.

Mr. A. W. Paterson said he had attended these examinations every year, and of late had noticed a marked improvement. He would particularly allude to the increased interest manifested by parents, as indicated by the presence of so many of them although the day was unpleasant. He did not notice the rudeness on the, part of the boy alluded to by Mr. Winslow: it was probably a mistake, although it was well to remind him of it. He was pleased to see so many visitors, as it showthat unanimity prevailed.

Thomas Crimmen Esq., said as the first Trustee had found some fault he would take another line, as faults should not be spoken of without naming the excellencies, also. The High school unlike other schools was a county institution, and the attendance being irregular, caused a great deal of trouble. The mathematical and other departments were execllent. This was the first examination he had attended as Trustee at this school, though he had often called in and been pleased with what he had seen. In conclusion he would state that Mr. S. U. McCully had offered a prize for Geometry to be given next

Mr. Oakes said he felt grateful to the gentlemen who had spoken because they had done so frankly, and he took in good part anything that had been said. He thought he must have been misunderstood, when he was represented as saying that he paid no attention to the pronunciation of Latin: On the contrary he was particular in correcting mistakes in Latin pronunciation, but he did not give instruction in the laws of Prosody until the pupils. came to the reading of Virgil. He had 26 different classes and could only give a short time to each; he therefore, could not give proper attention to every branch. He thought, however, that the pupils were making fair progress, and his aim was to develop the mind. One cause of the want of proficiency in some branches, was the irregularity of attendance. The co-operation of parents was earnestly to be desired and he felt that there was not always that amount of sympathy extended to teachers which there ought to be; and some pupils, on being offended, would stay away three or four days at a time. The co-operation of parents in relation to the graded system was also requested, as it was of great consequence, that the pupils should enter the departments at the right time. There were now three pupils undergoing written examination for diplomas and as the prizes were not at hand, he would again suggest to the Trustees that these prizes and certificates be given publicly at the entertainment the following evening.

After the examination was closed the trustees held a meeting with the Revds. Dr. Jardine, Forsyth, and McBain, by whom the candidates for diplomas had been examined for four days, for the purpose of receiving the report of the examinors. It was decided that the applicants were qualified to receive diplomas and that they should be presented the following evening.
