preme Court of Canada is, it is said, of opinion that neither the Provincial nor the Dominion Governments have power to bestow the title of Queen's Counsel, and that the use of the name of the Queen in Provincial Acts is clearly an act of usurpation for which those bodies may be punished.

FRANCE has a new President, M. Greevy, President McMahon having resigned because his Ministry would not accept his programme for the management of the army. Such an event at almost any former time would have kindled the fires of revolution in that country, but, happily, it will now, under the established Republican system of Government, be looked upon as only a political event happening in the natural order of things.

CAUGHT. - A series of alleged embezements, by Dunbar Browne, Collector Internal Revenue for the District of Montreal, have been discovered and Browne has been arrested. It appears that he has been in the habit of pocketthem to the credit of the Government. Two cases in the same department have, according to a Herald despatch, been discovered in Nova Scotia. In one case the party has been suspended, and in the other the party has found security for the defalcation, but he will probably be dismissed.

It is now asserted that the Osornes have obtained clear evidence that she and a gang of roughs with whom she was intimate, were the murderers of Mcarthy. She met McCarthy, it is alleged, as he was returning to the hotel at midnight under the influence of whiskey, and decoyed him along the bank of the Scadouc, where her accomplices robbed, killed and threw him in. One of these accomplices is expected to testify against her. During the trials last year she confessed in the witness box to a number of petty crimes, but her story of the guilt of the Osbornes could never be shaken.
