The Laurent Pinafore Company visited Chatham last week and presented the muchtalked-of opera on Friday and Saturday evenings in Masonic Hall. This Company is said to be one of the best that has visited Canada. As it appeared in Chatham there is room for improvement in some of the characters, although, as a whole, the piece was put on in a satisfactory manner. Of the leading parts that of "Dick Deadeve" was the best in make-up, acting and singing. Next in order of Merit was "Sir Joseph Porter," whose make up and acting were excellent. His is a character not requiring the best of voices and if he was capable of overdoing the part by a display of high vocal art and compass he wisely and correctly refrained from committing any such error. "Capt. Corcoran," like Deadeve and Sir Joseph, looked and acted his part well. He is an excellent baritone and as a singer and actor is calculated to please. "Josephine" acted fairly, but her face and figure are against her and her voice is uneven-good in a few notes o the upper and lower registers, but faulty on the rest-but English comic opera is suitable to such artists, as it affords opportunity for hiding defects which would appear in performances a more legitimate character. "Buttercup" acted well, but like all the others, excepting Deadeye, Sir Joseph and Capt. Corcoran, her enunciation lacked distinctness and the words of many lines so essential to the proper understanding of such a piece-were lost. "Hebe" acquitted herself creditably. The other characters were of fair average. The chorus was an excellent one, and contributed more than choruses usually do to the success of operas. Some allowance ought to be made because if the execrable condition of the piano, which was so much out of tune that it must have disgusted the accompanist, and, at times, misled the singers.
