In spite of all this you are to be faithful in preaching the Word. You are not to be tempted by the allurements that will lie in your way to speak smooth things, to yield to a depraved taste on the part of hearers. The world, with the fashion and the tastness thereof will endeavor to make you less than faithful in the discharge of duty, and on the part of a section of the religious world, a section that appears to be very pious and wonderfully devoted, there will be temptation, a zeal without judgment, a great breadth of sail being spread by way of profession and not enough of ballast to steady the ship and save it from shipwreck. In steering between these extremes it will become you to be faithful to conviction as to what is right, as to what is the will of God in the matter, and to be

loyal to the Church and its interests.

To preach the word faithfully and effectively demands preparation, honest painstaking preparation. I do not lose sight of the all-importance of the blessing of the spirit of God, nobody is to suppose that I ignore that without which there can the congregation that worships statedly in be no good result. The blessing of God does not presuppose lack of preparation, or even the preparation that is but imperfect. It is absurd to suppose that God will smile upon the preaching that costs the preacher nothing or but little, while He will reject that which is prepared with pains. He may reject the carefully prepared discourse, but it is for another reason.
