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

Our Ottawa Letter.

The following correspondence was held over from last week :-

OTTAWA, 12th April, '79.

The week just past will be somewhat

memorable for the vote on the Tariff, which has resulted in so large a majority while the whole House sustained this large proportion in favor of the tariff, the vote of New Brunswick was equally bat large in proportion against it. By the vote of her representative men New Brunswick has emphatically refused her assent to the National Policy. The North has spoken against it, the South has condemned it, and the East and West have joined in lifting up their voices against it. Restigouche, Gloucester and Northumberland on the North with Westmorland, Albert, St. John, Charlotte, Queens, Sunbury and York have protested against the tariff as unfair to New Brunswick, destructive to our great industries, burdensome to all our people, and conceived in disloyalty to the mother country. It is true that four from New Brunswick voted for the tariff. And, we may ask, who are they? Mr. Girouard of Kent, who sits for the first time in Parliament; He votes against the interests of the lumbermen, the farmers, the fishermen of Kent. Connell of Carleton. whose chances of ever being re-elected. against the talented young Appleby who cannot be kept down, were small by this vote. Last and least-Domville, of Kings-these are the men who have voted in favor of the tariff. Two only of the four attempted to give a reason. It is safe to say Mr. Tilley's chief reason lay in something foreign to the interests of New Brunswick, for only the other night he admitted that "the tariff was unpopular in NewBrunswick." Mr. Domville's reasons given were twofold, 1st, "he could swallow it whole," and 2nd, "what if it did injure New Brunswick; New Brunswick wasn't the whole Dominion!" It will be seen that Mr. Domville's swallowing capacity is only recalled by

There is not a man from New Brunswick who has spoken or voted against the tariff but has done so confidently. honestly and whole-heartedly. They have no fear of having forfeited the popular approval. It is different with those who took an opposite course, whether from New Brunswick or the other Provinces. Many of them were returned by very small majorities, in VEGETABLE SICILIAN some cases by one, two, four, five, six, seven and nine votes. Indeed a charge of 250 votes rightly placed at the last election and have kept out 25 protectionists and elected free trade representatives in their stead. These men know they cannot be again returned, and there is little doubt that when the people are appealed to the Protectionist party will topple down like a house of cards. New Brunswick so distinguished itself in debate on the floor of the Federal Parliament. The speeches of those of our representatives who spoke against the tariff made an exceedingly strong case. They were full of facts and argument strongly and forcibly put, and together constitute a dignified and statesmanlike protest on behalf of their Province against the injustice sought to be done her. These truly noble efforts cannot be forgotten by the people of New Brunswick. Mr. King was the first of them to speak and gave an admirable maiden effort, Mr. Weldon's, Mr. Charles Burpee's and Mr. Rogers' were strong, clear, practical speeches presenting every phase of interest and industry of New Brunswick. Mr. Snowball's effort, which, I see, has been placed before your readers, was delivered in that gentleman's best manner, carried the House thoroughly with him and aroused enthusiastic applause. More than this, it has elicited the warm commendations of the leaders of the Liberal Party in Parliament, while the press of the west including the Toronto Globe have commended it very highly. The opinion is universal here that not only the County of Northumberland but the House of Commons as well, have gained by the exchange made at the last election. Hon. Restoring The Dead.

The body of Merrick, who was hanged for murder in Indianapolis recently, was taken from the gallows directly to a medical college there and temporarily restored to life by artificial means. An account of the treatment will prove in-

The body was drawn upward at full length by the head until the toes rested in the tub in which he had lain. Instantly the assistants rubbed the body briskly with towels for two minutes, and then wrapped it from the shoulders down with a warm blanket. Then the head and neck were manipulated in every way to set the dislocated joint. After this the body was returned to the table, the windpipe opened and a tube enough, and who has sacrified them all inserted to which a bellows was attached.
