The Nova Scotia... note that "Other Fish Pickled" was exported to the extent of 31,938 bbls., valued at \$34,519.

Mr. W. M. McLean of St. John has compiled some very interesting statistics respecting Canadian Fisheries, which have appeared in the St. John Telegraph and Sun.

He shows that Nova Scotia exported of Pickled Mackerel, 89,726 bbls., valued at \$602,768. Most of this went to the United States and the British and Spanish West Indies. Only 378 bbls. were sent to Britain. Quebec exported absolutely no salt mackerel--or "nearly" none--say 71 barrels, all told. Prince Edward Island exported 1,702 bbls., valued at \$270,402, to the United States, and only a few dollars' worth to any other country.

New Brunswick's contribution to the exports was only 7,437 bbls., worth \$78,890--all to the States. The total exports of pickled mackerel footed up 128,954 bbls., valued at \$1,021,066.

Of Fresh Mackerel, Quebec exported 10,738 lbs.; Nova Scotia, 54,200 lbs.; New Brunswick, 87,883 lbs.; total, 152,871 lbs.; valued at \$7,419.

"Of preserved" or Canned Mackerel, Nova Scotia exported 55,608 lbs., and New Brunswick 13,318 lbs.; total 69,026 lbs., valued at \$6,995.

The total value of the mackerel exported last year was \$1,035,700.

Nova Scotia exported of Codfish 595,227 cwt.; value \$2,045,496, the bulk of which went to (1) British West Indies--\$971,137 worth; (2) Spanish West Indies--\$719,504; (3) United States--\$228,219; (4) French West Indies--\$204,271; (5) British Guiana--\$106,510.

Quebec exported 152,058 cwt.; value \$709,867. It went principally to South America, Italy, British West Indies and Great Britain.

Prince Edward Island exported 11,129 cwt.; value \$32,903; and New Brunswick shipped 16,251 cwt., valued at \$41,070.

The total shipments of dry codfish, therefore, amounted to 774,065 cwt., value \$3,189,336.

HERRING. Nova Scotia exported 98,053 bbls., Pickled, value \$67,569; principally to the British West Indies, Spanish West Indies and United States.

Quebec exported 3,887 bbls. to the United States, value \$14,886. Her total exports amounted to 1,877 bbls., value \$15,816.

P. E. Island exported 649 bbls., worth \$2,650. New Brunswick sent away 4,424 bbls., nearly all of which went to the United States.

Of Herring, Fresh, New Brunswick was the only Province that exported any, and she
