[From the St. John "Telegraph."] A case was decided in the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in April last which, although it has attracted comparatively little notice, is of great importance to those anglers who have leased rivers in this Province from the Dominion Government, for the purpose of fishing with the rod. The matter came up in the form of an action of trespass brought by the plaintiff, Judge Steadman, against Mr. C. A. Robertson, the gravamen of the action being that while the plaintiff was engaged in fishing for salmon with rod and fly in the South West Miramichi River, on land owned by the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Land Company, he was assaulted by the defendant and by another man, under defendant's orders, and his rod, line and reel taken from him. In justification of this assault the defendant pleaded in effect, that he held that portion of the river in which the plaintiff was fishing under lease from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries of Canada for a period of nine years from the 1st January, 1874, for the purpose of fly-fishing for salmon at an annual rent of fifty dollars, and that he had a right in protection of his fishing rights under this lease to seize the plaincase, the main question at issue being the power of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to grant the right of fishing in nontidal waters in this Province, and that this might be tested at the trial before Judge Wetmore, a verdict was entered by consent for \$100, with leave reserved to enter a nonsuit or verdict for the defendant, as the Court above might direct. The case was ably argued by M1. C. W. Weldon, Q. C., for the defendant and Mr. E. L. Wetmore for the plaintiff, and after taking time to consider from the 20th June, 1878, to April 1879, judgment was delivered by Mr. Justice Fisher deciding that the right of fishing was in the owner of the land bounding on the river, and that the Government of Canada had no right to grant licenses to fish in non-tidal rivers in New Brunswick, except where the land bounding on the river is the property of the Dominion. As all the ungranted land in New Brunswick, is the property of the Provincial Government,

The grant to the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Land Company was peculiar in this, that it seemed to except the bed and waters of the South West Miramichi and retain them in the Crown, but the Court held that even if this were so, which they did not assent to, it would not help the defendant, as the right of fishing did not depend on the ownership of the bed of the stream, but on the ownership of the river's bank. In other words, it was held that the riparian proprietor has the exclusive right of fishing in a non-tidal river. This proposition was supported by the very highest authority in recent appeal cases in the House of Lords, which is, as Mr. Justice Fisher observed, "The highest Court of Appeal in the Empire." > enacted laws for the regulation of its fisheries, and these laws were in force at the time of the Union. The Union Act gave the Parliament of Canada the right to legislate in regard to "sea coast and inland fisheries," but to the rrovincial Legislatures the right to make laws with reference to "property and civil rights." Judge Fisher holds that the power of Parliament to legislate with regard to the fisheries, as given in the Union Act, must be held to be the same power enjoyed by the Provincial Legislatures before the Union to provide for the protection and regulation of the fisheries, and does not authorize Parliament to touch rights of property in the fisheries. Were it otherwise, the learned Judge argues, the authority given to Parliament to legislate with respect to "navigation and shipping" would enable it "to deal with the property in ships of ship-owners. The right in the ship is no higher than the right in the fish to the reparian proprietor." Judge Fisher then goes on to deal with the Act of Parliament 31 Vic., cap. 60, under which the Fishery Licenses were issued, and to contend that it merely contemplated the regulation and protection of the fisheries of Canada, in the same way as they had been formerly dealt with by the individual Provinces, the object being to provide a uniform system for the whole Dominion. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries by this Act was empowered to grant leases and licenses where the exclusive right of fishing did not already exist by law. This the Judge observes was "substantially what the old Provincial law did." Wherever the right to the fish had been acquired by an individual there was no authority to lease. When the stream was in the Crown the license could issue. Now, with few exceptions in this Province, the
