SUDDEN DEATH. - An inquest was held on Monday last by Dr. J. S. Benson, Coroner, on the body of John Horan who was found dead in his house on Sunday morning at 9 o'clock. The evidence went to shew, from the position in which the deceased was found and the clothes which he appeared to have just taken off, that he had been preparing for bed, and had fallen off the bench upon which he had apparently been sitting while undressing himself. The verdict was, death from natural causes.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH. - On Monday last an inquest was held by Dr. J. S. Benson, Coroner, on the body of Alex. Lambert lumberman. From the evidence it appeared that deceased, in company with Mr. Buckley, and a man named Pitman were walking over a landing of logs on the Napan River, on Monday morning, when a few of the logs started from under their feet. Buckley saw the danger and warned the other two men to look out for them. selves. Deceased and Pitman ran ahead while Mr. Buckley stepped back. The deceased either stepped or fell into a hole, and one of the logs struck him on the right de and knocked him down. Pitman,1. the meanwhile, had ran and sprung into the river, and when he looked out of the water he saw Mr. Buckley trying to raise the log resting on deceased's arm. Deceased was then carried to the house of Mr. Cribbs and was visited by Dr. J. S. Benson. He was suffering from shock and was pulseless at the wrist, and the heartbeat was scarcely discernible. There were no benes broken and no external injury was apparent except a scratch on the face Death ensued shortly afterwards. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.


