They charge \$15.00 a week for board, and the poor men spend their money for drink : twenty-five cents for two drinks. They charge thirty cents a barrel for water, and for farmers they must have \$500,00 clear when they get here or they will fail. I would advise no one to come here till the road is finish-

Newcastle Steam Fire Engine.

The people of Newcastle are to be congratulated on having secured a steam fire engine. After its arrival at the Shire Town it was subjected to faithful tests | federation. there, and also in competition with the Chatham engine, the general result being so favorable as to please all interested.

The machine was built by Mr. Ronaldwhose works are, we believe, located in Brussels Ontario, and have been in successful operation for twelve yearsand the cost including two hose reels and usual fittings was \$3,400. There was no object or means by which to make a regular test of perpendicular or elevation throwing, but the verdict on all sides was that it could not be determined which of the two had the advantage. On a horizontal test an advantage of some nine feet of spraydash was with the Newcastle machine, which carried a maximum of 120 lbs of steam while the Chatham engine was working with eighty. I am somewhat familiar with many of the most respectable dry goods merchants, hardware, crockeryware and grocery merchants in St. John, many of whom have to discharge some of their clerks, business is so depressed. When I grumble at the advance in price I am consoled by a sight of the new tariff. When I go in to the Country Market I find farm produce at the very lowest ebb, except potatoes. What a pity they are so scarce in the Upper Provinces, so that they could glut our markets. I go to the iron merchant and I find an advance of seven dollars per ton on iron. The consumer must pay for all, but what has he to pay with? When I go to the Recording Office I find bills of sale, deeds and mortgages filed to keep creditors from seizing their article, as he might burst with a sense of throttle. When I have good paper many of the merchants are afraid to endorse it. which I had no difficulty in getting done twelve months ago. I have invited Mr. Domville to bring to this county of Kings. that he unfortunately represents, a car load of those lists of irredeemable shinplasters, as they may cover his political fillibustering for a time.
