With reference to that factory, an impression prevails, and not without foundation, that it was in contemplation long before the introduction of the tariff. The article proposed to be manufactured, a combination lock, is protected by a patent from the Dominion as well as the United States, and, I daresay, the British Government as well. It must appear to everybody that the manufacture of that lock, if an article of merit, can be as successfully prosecuted under a low as under a high tariff. The Finance Minister further

During the recess it has been my good fortune to obtain a copy of the report of Mr. Everitt, which I have carefully analyzed. It will be understood that the Minister of Finance has sought to create the impression, whether warranted or not, that New Brunswick, according to population, was ahead of any other Province of the Dominion as a manufacturing centre. Let me read from Mr. Everitt's report in order to see whether the position the honorable gentleman has taken, is sustained by the report he chose to quote from. 
