----Another Charge of Plagiarism.

Rev. William Mitenell, of St. Andrew' Church, St. John, is probably the most copular preacher in that city, and he has me of the finest churches in the Maritime Provinces. After the St. John fire, he was charged with having used a sermon that had been preached by a Chicago clergyman immediately after the great fire in that city. The matter created quite a sensation at that time. Mr. Mitchell's numerous friends stood by him in the case, and were satisfied with his explanation, which was that he had unconsciously used the ideas of the other minister, which had made an impression on his mind when he read the sermon. It now seems that Mr. Mitchell is concerned in another charge of plagiarism, this time as the accuser of another clergyman, who is calling him to account before the church court. The Queen's Speech.

London, March 24. - The British Parliaent was prorogued to-day. Following the text of the Queen's Speech :-My Lords and Gentlemen: As the time assigned by law for the

ermination of the present Parliament is near at hand, I am induced by considerations of public policy and convenience to select this period of the session for releasng you from your legislative duties, with view to an immediate dissolution and the issue of writs for a general election. I cannot part from you without expressing my deep sense of the zeal and ability which, during more than six years, you have consistently displayed in exercising our important functions, nor without endering my warm acknowledgments for the useful measures you have submitted for my acceptance, and especially for the nanner in which you have upheld a policy the object of which was at once to defend my Empire and secure the general peace of Europe. My relations with foreign Powers are friendly and favourable to the maintenance of tranquility in Europe. entertain a confident hope that the mea--ures adopted in Afghanistan will lead to speedy settlement of that country. I have had much satisfaction in assenting to the Acts you have passed for the relief of the dist ess. unhappily prevalent in parts of Ireland, and trusting these measures will be accepted by my Irish subjects as proof of the ready sympathy of the Imerial Parliament, I look forward with confidence to the restored prosperity of their country. I rejoice to observe indicaions of a general improvement in trade. und that the commercial depression which I have had to liment appears to be passing way. I have witnessed with the greatest sympathy the heavy losses sustained by arious clases connected with the cultivation of the soil, and have viewed with ad miration the patience and high spirit with which they have cortended against an almost unprecedented series of disastrons easons.
