It must, however, be acknowledged that the Canada Temperance Act cannot yet be adopted in several localities where its operations are most needed; it is, therefore, important that in addition to special efforts on behalf of the Act, a general agitation in favor of the principles of the Alliance should be constantly maintained in every portion of the land, and that in so far as the various Provincial License Laws furnish restraints upon the Liquor Traffic, the provisions of such laws should

be honestly and rigidly enforced.
