Collapsing of the American Independent Catholic Church.

(New York World, 10th.)

Thomas Frederick Powers, a man under middle age, who says he is a clergyman, was taken before Justice Wandell at the Yorkville Police Court yesterday. Edward N. Fishblatt, M. D., "Treasurer of the American Independent Catholic Church," complained that Powers last Friday came to his house and said he was much interested in that independent church. The following Sunday Mr. Powers was one of the principal speakers in a meeting held in Clarion Hall. On the same day he spoke in Brooklyn. Since Friday he had remained at Dr. Fishblatt's house and did not seem to have any idea of going away. Last Tuesday he asked Dr. Fishblatt for \$40 for his services and did not get it. The following night he repeated his demand and left the house in anger. Yesterday morning he called again and was so boisterous that a policeman was summoned. "I believe he is a spy set upon us to find out what we are doing," Dr. Fishblatt finally said.

The prisoner tried to speak, but burst into tears. Finally confessing himself he said he was a native of County Waterford, Ireland, had been a Catholic, but had become a Baptist and was ordained a minister in that faith on August 4, 1864, in New Carlisle, Clark County, O., and settled in St. John, N. B. Then he took to drink. In 1865 he was practicing medicine in New Haven, Conn., where his wife had him arrested several times for intoxication. He had broken off the habit of drinking several months since. A week ago he saw an advertisement of the Independent Catholic Church which called for Christian teachers and helpers. It seemed to suit his case exactly and he came to New York and called on Dr. Fishblatt. "When I applied to Dr. Fishblatt," Powers continued, "he said 'Yes, you will do nicely.' It was afterwards agreed that I should be introduced next Sunday as the Rev. Father Powers, an ex-priest. I told him that I was not a priest, but a Baptist minister, but he said 'expressions sounded better and would make the collection larger.' I refused to be introduced as an ex-priest, but he insisted on it and remarked that he wished he had half a dozen men like me."

"But how about this \$40?" asked the magistrate.

"That was ordered to be paid at a meeting of the congregation of the Church, at which meeting I was elected Secretary of the society," Dr. Fishblatt promised to pay me the money out of his own pocket if it was not in the treasury. When I asked it of him, he told me to wait until next Sunday's collection had been taken. I gave up all idea of getting the money, and having previously lent Dr. Fishblatt money on Wednesday, I went to him to ask for \$2 to get me to New Haven. He my money in buying meals for Father Quin and Prof. Wood, who spoke with me that Sunday."

Justice Wandell asked Dr. Fishblatt, what the Independent Catholic Church was. Mr. Powers spoke up: "Why it's no church at all, Judge; it has no organization. There are no members. A rheumatic invalid has promised it \$5,000 if he can be satisfied of its sincerity as a church."

Dr. Fishblatt said the church had been regularly incorporated on April 1st and would not want for money if it was successful. "Powers is a spy and he has attempted to extort money," he added.

Justice Wandell asked if any of the members were present. John McAllister, an upholsterer, of 300 First Avenue, said he was one of the seven governors of the Church, but could not remember what the seven were called until Justice Wandell suggested "trustees." Yes I guess that's it," he said feebly. The congregation, according to him, met in different halls, but the headquarters was Dr. Fishblatt's house. Justice Wandell said that there being no complaint Mr. Powers and that he was discharged.

The New York Herald devotes three columns to an account of Powers' trial and his connection with the Independent Catholic Church. Many residents of St. John will remember Powers' first appearance here in 1859. He had run away from his home (on the North Shore, we believe) and had come to St. John. He was then 14 or 15 years old, and a Catholic in religion. Here he complained that he had been beaten for reading the Bible, etc., etc. He quickly gained great notoriety, the late L. A. Whitton, then Judge, referring to the matter at a Bible Society meeting and proposing a controversy with the late Archdeacon Connolly, which caused considerable excitement at the time. Powers went away, and returned five or six years later an ordained Baptist minister. He preached in the Bethel (on Duke Street) and also on board the vessels in the harbor. He did not remain here long, however, and when he did leave, he departed under a cloud. Since that date he has had a chequered career--at times practicing as a doctor, at times finding himself in prison for misconduct. The "Independent Catholic Church," in which he figured last week, seems to have been founded for the purpose of steering ecclesiastical boats.
