

I need not, I think, under these circumstances, take up a great deal of the time of the House in a discussion with the hon. gentleman of any claim to economy or financial skill, but I may say I am accused in certain quarters of envying very much the great a tainments of my hon. friend the Minister of Finance. I believe there are people in this country who venture occasionaly to insinuate that I am excessively jealous of the laurels of my hon. friend. I would be unworthy the position I occupy if I were not willing to say in this House that the people of Canada owe a debt of gratitude to the present Minister of Finance for the painstaking manner in which he has devoted himself to the solution of a problem. problem, on the successful solution of which rests the question of life or death for Canada. (Prolonged applause.) The hon. gentleman said the Finance Minister had traveled this country like a commercial traveller. It would be in the interests of Canada if that hon, gentleman could have been induced to adopt the same course, and instead of driving away with contumely every man, however high his position, who wished to offer advice. and wrapping himself up in that grandiloquent robe of immaculate knowledge, he had ventured occasionally to place himself in communication with the intelligent men of this country who are engaged in sustaining and developing its interests. (Applause.) I say, if ever I envied the Finance Minister it was to-night. Why? Because the hon. gentleman occupies a proud position, and because he has the satisfaction of knowing that instead of having the discreditable record of the hon. policy he has laid before it. (Cheers.) Let me notice an objection to the protection tariff. It was said that in adopting the tariff we were going to alienate the people of England. As in the case of the revenue, so in regard to the bearing of the tariff on England. The Finance Minister has shown that the fiscal policy of the Government has changed the channel of trade, into which it was driven by the hon, gentlemen opposite, and instead of Canada being made tributary to the Southern Republic, and occupying the positions of hewers of wood and drawers of water to the Republic, the policy of the present Government has turned the trade again into that channel which every loval British subject must infinitely prefer to that which had been selected by the hon. gentlemen opposite. What are the objects of the sugar and tea duties? The whole policy of the late Administration was to build up Boston and New York as commercial capitals of Canada, and make this country tributary to the Republic instead of developing our trade with the Mother Country, to which we owe so much, and to whose institutions we are proud to belong. (Cheers.) It was, moreover, argued that the tariff would annoy the Americans, and that we should be careful least they should swallow us whole. The bugbear of American hostility was attempted to be excited, and every effort to embitter the United States against Canada had beed used, but it was tried in vain. There is not an intelligent American who does not feel that as imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, we had imitated them in a measure in regard to our fiscal policy. The subject was mentioned by a leading member of the American Embassy, who said "We cannot make the people of England understand that in Canada and the United States there is no alternative for any of us but the policy of protecting our own interests." (Cheers.) The effect is not to instil a feeling of irritation among the American people towards a policy which to a certain extent is in unison with their own. They are intelligent, independent enough to be able to respect the policy of a country which is not willing to live by sufferance, but so independent as to pursue such a policy as, we believe, is in the interest of our own country. True it is, that it has had an effect in the Republic. It has set the first minds in commercial circles to ascertain whether a change cannot be obtained in Canadian trade by adopting such a fair measure of reciprocity as would promote the interests of both parties. (Cheers.) The old story was reiterated, that the Government would make this a dear country to live in, that they would tax the people to such an extent as to deplete the country. But the tariff changes have provided employment for hundreds and thousands, and have not driven away our people.
