HON. MR. HOLTON'S DEATH.

St. Patrick's Day was, as stated in last week's ADVANCE, celebrated by a Fox Hunt and trotting races on the river. The committee in charge of the arrangement were Messrs. Dennis McEvoy and D nnis Quigley of Newcastle, and Messrs. John McGowan, M. Brennan and Daniel Desmond of Chatham. The foxes were owned by Mr. John Fay of Newcastle and were hardly full grown. There was nothing of the features of a fox hunt about the affair. There were several thousand persons present and hundreds of teams. The crowd could not or would not be controlled, and when the first fox was liberat. ed it was almost surrounded by the excited spectators. Its run was short, Mr. John McGinnis' dog soon cutching it, assisted by several boys.


