The Deficit. Sir S. L. Tilley estimated that the revenue of the Pominion from all sources for the financial year ending June 30th, 1880, would be over 241 millions, and that with this revenue and after transferring \$1,000,000 from last year's account to the credit of this year, the deficit would be half a million. The supplementary estimates brought down afterwards increased the deficit. But the revenue will fall far short of his expectations, although he received as duties on coal and breadstuffs some quarter of a million more than he anticipated. The Canada Gazette gives the receipts for April and for the year up to April 30th, as follows :-

nance Minister, nearly \$6,400,000 must be received in the months of May and June. It is wholly improbable that any such amount can be collected. A SAD REPORT :-- If the statement by the captain of the Govino, now in port, is correct, and that our reporter has no reason to doubt, the light-house and semaphore signal station at Bird Rocks. which is situated at the extreme North end of the Magdalen Islands, have only one individual, and it is questionable if he is an adult, to tend one of the most important lights under the Marine and Fishery Department. Mr. Gregory, the agent at Quebec, is promptly investigating the circumstances, which, so far as known, are as follows :- On the 4th of May, the Govino was boarded by a sealer short of provisions. and they stated that fifteen miles to the northward the water was clear, and that the lighthouse keeper of Bird Rocks and his son, having ventured out in a boat. lost a row-lock and perished in the ice. It is hoped that there may be some mistake. At the same time there is every reason to fear it is only too true. The name of the unfortunate lighthouse keeper was, we believe, W. Hall, and he was entitled to two assistants, there being not only a semaphore to work, but a gun to be fired half hourly during the fogs and snow storms .- Montreal Witness.
