Wallace Ross Victorious. Hanlan Takes Sick & Gives Up.

WHAT THEY SAY IN ST. JOHN

[From the "Daily Telegraph." PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 17. Probably the city of Providence never saw as many people within its limits as gathered on the banks of the Seekonk today. The number is variously estimated from 40,000 to 100,000. They came by rail, street car, sailboat, barges, steamers and every conceivable mode of conveyance. It was a peaceable crowd, a'l intent on seeing the grand race, but the proportion that had any definite idea of who started

to row or finished was remarkably small, as the river was crowded with craft of all descriptions, whose occupants thought the best position for viewing the race was between the grand stands, of which there were a dozen or more, along the course. The press facilities were poor, also for the same reason, inefficient or rather utter want of police on the course.
