At last Private Runty, a member of Earl Waldegrave's company, went to them and told them that he was going to win the Olympic next day. He told them that all their principal prizes had been bought, and that to prove it, and to bring the matter before them in an unmistakable manner, he had come to tell them that he had arranged to win the Olympic on the following day with a score of 46 points on target No. 14. They gave him permission to make arrangements to do so if he were able, agreeing to hold him absolutely free from all blame in the matter, and he announcing that he had no intention of taking the prize. The next morning he called at the Council tent and said that he had completed his arrangements, and asked for some one to accompany him to the firing point. Mr. Humphrey, the well-known shot, was selected to do so, and the two went to gether to target 14, where Runty got his score of 46 points out of a possible 50, as he had previously announced, although one of his shots missed the target altogether. Shooting on that target was at once stopped, and the sergeant with whom the arrangement was made was subsequently placed under arrest, and is to be tried by court-martial. He will probably be severely punished, but it will require something more than this to restore confidence and to place Wimbledon in the position it formerly occupied in the estimation of shooting men. Every man who has won an important prize is looked upon with suspicion, and I heard many competitors thanking heaven that they had not been successful. Before the crowns of England and Scotland were united under James 1., the flag carried by English ships was white, with the red cross of St. George emblazoned on it:and that hoisted on board the ships of Man, deals, D. & J. Ritchie & Co. Scotland was blue, with the cross of St. Andrew, on it; the red lines of the first being perpendicular and horizontal, those of the latter diagonal. Some differences having arisen between the ships of the two countries, His Magesty, to prevent this in future, and to teach his people that they formed one nation, ordained that a new flag should be adopted, having the cross of St. George interlaced with that of St. Andrew. on the blue ground of the flag of Scotland. All ships were to carry it at the main mast head, but the English ships were to display the St. George's red cross at their sterns, and the Scottish that of St. Andrew. On April 12, 1606, the Union Jack was first hoisted at sea, but it was not till the Parliamentary union of the two countries, in 1707, that it was adopted as the military flag of Great Britain. Both services, therefore, now use it as a national banner.—Antiquary.


