Coun. Freeze said that the apportionment of the Alms House assessment was an injustice to Blissfield, which he trusted the Council would set right. The parish of Newcastle seemed especially favored by the report of the Committee, who had not revised the apportionment recommended by the Alms House Commissioners, as he claimed they ought to have done. It was unfortunate for the smaller parishes that their representatives on the Alms House Board lived at such remote distances from the place of meeting that they could not in many cases, be present to guard the interests of those parishes, and it was, therefore, necessary that the Council should afford the protection which this condition of things called for. Newcastle owed a debt of \$344,86 on Alms House account and had 13 paupers in the Alms House, while Blissfield, which owed only 8 cents and had no paupers in the institu tion was to be assessed \$100. Newcastle was in debt \$26.24 on Alms House Account in 1878; her debt was increased during the past year to \$344.86 and next year her default would probably be greater with an assessment of only \$800, and he called upon those members of the Council who knew of the wrong done to Blissfield, as well as to some other parishes, to insist on having the apportionment made more in accordance with equity and justice.

Coun. Betts said all the parishes were sufficiently represented on the Alms House Board, and it seemed reasonable to believe that the information before that body was such as to enable it to arrive at quite as equitable an apportionment of assessment as could be determined upon.

He moved for a Committee to re-arrange

the apportionment of Alms House assess-

Coun. Lawlor said this was not the first time that the Council had been favored with Blissfield's complaints in connection with the Alms House. He would le among the first to assist in rectifying any wrong that might be done that, or any other parish, but it was well known that Blissfield's member of the Alms House Board was generally on hand when meetings were held and it was to be supposed that he could take care of its interests. It seemed like an attack upon him for Coun. Freeze to make the complaint he had presented to the Council. Coun. Freeze seemed to forget that there were certain charges in connection with the Alms House which were borne by the County, and Plissfield could not expect to shift her share of these to the other parishes. Blissfield, as well as some other parishes appeared to act as if they thought that they gained by aiding some of their paupers without sending them to the Alms House. If Coun. Freeze would look into this phase of the matter he would find that the granting of such aid was an expensive mistake for the parish, as paupers were supported in the Alms House at only a fraction of the cost of maintaining them in any other way.

Coun. Bamford said he could not understand how Blissfield, with a paltry debt of eight cents was assessed \$100 on Alms House Account where she had no paupers in the Alms House, while other parishes, which were so far behind, and had paupers in the Alms House, were placed at an advantage. For this reason he seconded Coun. Freeze's motion for a committee to change the assessment to a more just basis. He was in favor of giving justice to all the Parishes. He would ask; also, that other Councillors should see that justice was done to his Parish.

BY LAW RELATING TO DOGS:-Be it ordered by the Municipal Council f the County of Northumberland: 1st-that the owner, keeper or harborer of any dog or dogs, in the front lots of the Middle District of the Parish of Chatham, shall, between the first days of February and May in each and every year, register his or her name in full with the name of the street on which they reside or cause

the same to be so registered in a book to be kept for that purpose at the Police Office, in the said District, and shall place or cause to be placed opposite his or her name the number of dogs he or she owns. keeps or harbors; and any person who shall be guilty of a breach of any of the provisions of this section shall, for every offence, be liable to a penalty of \$2.00 and in default of payment of any such fine the said dogs hall be killed by order of

the magistrate imposing such fine. 2nd-that the Collector of Dog Tax for said District, shall procure a book to be paid for out of the money collected for Dog Tax, and place the same in the said Police Court on or before the 1st day of February, in each year, for the purpose of said Collector shall when, in his knowledge or on being informed of any person who has committed a breach of the foregoing section shall prosecute such person, and the omission of such Collector to so

prosecute within ten days after such knowledge or information shall subject him to a fine of \$2.00. 3rd-that the owner, keeper or harborer of any bitch who shall allow or permit such bitch when in season to go at large in the said front lots in the said Middle District of Chatham, shall be liable to a penalty of \$5.00 and in default of payment thereof the said bitch shall be killed

by the direction of the magistrate who imposes such penalty. 4th-that all fines and penalties recorded under any of the foregoing sections, shall be paid over to the said Collector by the magistrate imposing the same and the said Collector shall enter in the said book. to be kept in the said Police Court, all such fines and penalties together with the names of the parties paying the same.

5th-that all fines and penalties recovered under the foregoing sections shall be applied for Alms House purposes, for the Parish of Chatham, according to Section Second of the Bye-Laws relating to Dogs. 6th-that this law shall come in force on the first day of January 1880.

## Kent Finances.

The people of Kent County wish that the Municipal Council now in session would, through its Finance Committee, let them know the worst respecting the finances by publishing the actual debt. Another matter for consideration is the proposal of some method to liquidate the indebtedness. At present a Kent County School warrant carries about 40% discount, as the drafts must stand unpaid for nearly three years after they become due. The County is about three years behind in paying its school warrants. It would, certainly, be better for the County to resort to direct taxation to wipe out the burden it now carries, than to thus compel the School Districts to sacrifice their warrants. When the Councillors have found out how much Kent owes, some of them will be disagreeably surprised. Let them grapple with the payment question, or proounce their incapacity for the management of Municipal affairs.
