That the National Church of Scotland is in imminent danger, is the warning issued by Conservative journals throughout the United Kingdom. Its disestablishment and disendowment are likely to be proposed in the present Parliament, and unless the most resolute exertions are made out of doors to counteract the influences at work within, the probability is that the proposal will be carried. Mr. Gladstone and the Marquis of Hartington, both cautiously said that if the Scotch constituencies showed that they wanted the Scotch Church to be abolished as an institution in connection with the State, they were ready to carry such wishes into effect. To all intents and purposes they have now been afforded the coveted opportunity of doing so. Out of the sixty members returned for Scotland, more than one half are unconditionally in favor of the disestablishment of the Scotch Church. Not a single Radical returned for a constituency north of the Tweed has declared himself hostile to the proposal, while several have expressed their readiness to accept the verdict of the country in regard to the question, or to follow the leaders of their party if they should make up their minds to an aggressive step. Against this large Parliamentary body clamoring for the disestablishment and disendowment of the Scotch Church, there are only six Conservatives to counteract their influence. Episcopalians generally are, however, preparing to fight for the Scotch National Church on the ground that should the attacking party succeed in carrying the first parallel.

Riley Probable. COURTNEY WANTS ANOTHER CHANCE. (From The Toronto Globe.) WASHINGTON, D. C., May 19.—The Hanlan-Courtney boat race is over at last, and long ere this, the bulletins have announced that Hanlan was victorious once more, and that the Union Springs sculler has at last had his claims to aquatic superiority settled now and for all time. It is not worth while to bore the readers , of THE GLOBE with a copy of the articles of agreement, which were of the usual stereotyped form, with the notable excep. tion that in case either Courtney or Hanlan refused to start, Riley should be allowed to take the place of the delinquent. The race was to be five miles with a turn, meaning that the contestants were to pull two and a half miles, turn separate buoys, and pull back to the place of starting. A row of red flags marked the centre of the course, and the scullers were bound by the rules each to keep his own side of these flags, thus guarding against the possibility of a foul. No boats other than those of the contestants and the steamer carrying the referee and the representatives of the press were to be allowed on the course while the race was being rowed, and the steamers named were bound to run in such a way as to keep entirely clear of the oarsmen, and in no way to interfere with their progress. THE COURSE.

Though there were many who condemn-

ed Mr. Blaikie's selection of Washington

and the Potomac as the scene of the great contest, it is safe to say that few who came were inclined to persist in such condemnation. There is no more beautiful city on the Continent, its handsome parks scattered here and there throughout every part, its broad avenues and clean, well paved roadways suggesting to the visitor just what a city ought to be, while the many great historic associations which cluster around almost every square foot of the place, render it a spot of far more than common interest. Here, it has often been remarked, is the place where an American sculler would win if he could win anywhere. To-day Courtney had the eyes of the great men of his own peorle upon him, and if aught could nerve the man to the task that lay before him he should have carried the blue and white to the front. As will be seen by the accompanying map, the starting flags were set only a short distance below the monster aqueduct bridge, which, besides its own roadway, carries the great body of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal across the Potomac on its massive stone arches. From this point it will be seen that the river runs eastward till it passes the head of Analostan Island, and thence nearly south all the way to the turning buoys.
