When such a man dies it is fitting that the event should be publicly emphasised, in order that the lesson to be learned from his life may not be lost upon those who come after him. Mr. Searle, though possessing no worldly advantages in starting life, won for himself the heritage of a good name by sobriety, industry and integrity. On Monday afternoon last he was laid to rest in St. Paul's Churchyard. His late associates in the societies we have named were present in their official capacity to pay the last outward tribute of respect to one they had learned to esteem so highly, while the general attendance of citizens of all classes fittingly expressed the prevailing sentiment of the community in which he had passed the greater part of his life. He leaves a widow and two sons, James and George, and two daughters, Mrs. J. R. Goggin and Mrs. C. Vanchild. His property has been devised to
