



Weaving has been done by machinery, and possibly some other things, ever since the days of Job; but the present generaturbance within a radius of a few miles tion will always be pre-eminent for what it has done in the way of superseding hand-It has been computed that the power labor. Let me enumerate a few of the improvements that have been made within my own recollection. I remember the time when every clock and watch that ticked in the world was made by hand, and no wonder that they were expensive luxuries. Each of the tiny screws had to be turned, and every cog in every little wheel measured off and cut by itself, and every part carefully adjusted to fit every other part, while the slightest defect in the complicated workmanship might utterly destroy the value of the article. Clocks and watches have now ceased to be the luxuries of the rich, and the products of our American manufactories have taken precedence of the best time-keepers made

> by hand-labor abroad. I have often, in my boyhood, watched the slow process of making a silver spoonthe gradual drawing of the bar of metal to the proper length, the hammering it into shape, the cutting and filing and polishing and etching-I should think that it must have taken a full day for a man to get up a single spoon-and now they are tumbled out of the machine with marvelous rapidity, and if a cheaper metal is used

I remember when it was said that it took seventeen men to make a pin, and the head-which was made by twisting a fine wire around the end of the pin-was always liable to drop off. Since that time I have seen a much better article produced without the touch of a human hand-the cutting, head-making, pointing, polishing, even sticking of the pins into the paper and folding up into packages, being done

by machinery. I remember when every boot and shoe worn in the United States was made by hand; all the pegs and nails being driven in one by one, and each stitch requiring the preliminary prick of an awl and the careful insertion of a bristle attached to the waxed threads, each of which must then be pulled tight by hand, while the shoemakers, sitting on low, leather seats. and breathing an atmosphere that no one would suppose to be conducive to mental activity, wore away the weary hours in

It has thus ence to bring its methods to the responsible task of throwing a better light on the origin, history, and true character of the Christian oracles than has been derived from uncritical tradition. Nor does the critical attitude taken by Professor Smith at all compromise his Christian position. He is no skeptic, trying to undermine the Scriptures. He holds to their essential truth, but recognizes that on earth and in time, and among ignorant, selfish, and prejudiced men, truth is liable to be obscured. -PROF. E. L.
